

Dr. Karmaveer Bhaurao Patil was born on 22 September, 1887 at Kumbhoj, in the Kolhapur district of Maharashtra. He realized that the social ills could be remedied through the education of the masses alone and so laid the foundation of the Rayat Shikshan Sanstha by opening a Boarding House at Kale (Tal-Karad, Dist-Satara) in 1919. Soon, however, in 1924 he shifted the head-quarters of his educational Institution to Satara. In his view, education is the means to empower the masses to enjoy the fruits of freedom and to emancipate them from social, economic and cultural slavery. The value of its contribution to education in general is enormously great as it has, from the very beginning, tried all its best to lay emphasis on the education of the down- trodden, the poor and the ignorant that really form the major bulk of the society.

The Rayat Shikshan Sanstha is one of the leading educational institutions in Asia. The institution works with a noble mission, and a noble cause with 'Education through self help' as its motto. 'Earn and Learn' scheme introduced by Karmaveer Bhaurao Patil has been widely accepted by other educational institutions. This scheme has supported many financially weaker students to pursue education. Today, Sanstha runs 42 Colleges, 438 secondary schools, 8 training colleges, 42 primary schools (English medium-20), 31 pre-primary schools (English medium- 18), 80 cosmopolitan hostels, 7 administrative offices, 8 Ashrams alas, and 57 ancillary Branches. It has spread in 15 districts of Maharashtra and 1 district of Karnataka with 14627 (female 3717) employees belonging to 170 castes and communities and 3 lakh 54 thousand 165 students (female 2, 11,474). 




PREFACE

Annasaheb Awate whose name has been given to this college was a veteran educationist and a social reformer of this region besides, the science faculty is named after Hutatma Babu Genu who breathed his last while fighting against the atrocities of the British rulers. The college was responsible for educating the first generation of the region. The college owns 105 acres of land and 55 acres of land is used for infrastructure while remaining 50 acres is used for the social forestry. The college campus has a rich environmental and natural beautiful background therefore; the agro-based projects such as custard apple, fig, coconuts, tamarind nuts, medicinal plants, rose garden etc. are being carried on. The college has a substantial share in the community development programme and it usually adopts tribal and interior villages as extension work. There has been a substantial growth in the research work. NSS and NCC are consistently active in various areas to help the community at large. Collaboration with local industries, extension

Padmabhushan Dr. Karmaveer Bhaurao Patil,great visionary leader established 'The Rayat Shishan Sanstha' in 1919. Our institute is one of the branches of theis Sanstha (the mother institute) and established in the year 1966. In the beginning onle Arts and Commerce were started. This was the first college in the North Pune District. After Pune there was no college upto Sangamner (a distance of 150 km). To creat apportunity of higher education to the tribal, hilly, youngsters of this region this college was established by the local reformers and the politicians as the branch of the Rayat Shikshan Sansth, and named 'Annasaheb Awate College, Manchar. Science facuty was started in the year 1982. The college name is extended as 'Annasaheb Awate Arts, Commerce and Hutatma Babu Genu Science College, Manchar.' College campus is spread over 105 acres with agro forestry and four lakes. A higher education facility for the tribal, economically backward classes is now available here – up to M.A., M.Com. M.Sc., Ph.D. along with professional courses llike B.Sc.-Bio-Tec,B.C.A. The Institute has been accredited with 'B' level (Jan 2004) and reaccredited with again 'B' grade (with CGPA 2.63, Mar-2011) by NAAC. Just we completed 50 years and in this

<u>Criterion Wise Summary</u>

Golden Jubille Year of our institute we are facing the 3rd cycle of the NAAC.

Criterion I: Curricular Aspects

The college offers a large number of courses which are university approved. There are a large number of departments in the college and students have a wide choice of electives. Many teachers are members of the University Boards of Studies and thus are directly involved in drafting of the syllabus of various subjects. The teachers adopt varied innovative teaching practices and there is a constant interaction between the administrative and the heads of the department meetings. The curriculum teaching is enriched through such measures as Adjunct Faculty. The college has a regular mechanism of receiving feedback from students and taking action on the basis of the responses. The college has been working in the right direction as far as the curricular aspects are concerned. The college is affiliated to Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune. The curriculum, admissions and evaluation processes are followed as per the norms and rules as prescribed by the State Government and the University. It has been





well represented on University Boards of Studies where its faculty members have been providing valuable inputs to the Board members. Within the institution, teachers are working on drafting syllabi for its own short term courses. The heads of the departments have been monitoring the teaching pace of departmental members in their departmental meetings to ensure that the syllabus is fully covered by them.

Criterion II: Teaching - Learning and Evaluation

The admission to various classes/programmes is made in accordance with the procedures prescribed by the State Government and SPPU. Due publicity of the admission programme is made by displaying detailed notifications of admission programme on college notice boards as well as on college website (<u>http://www.aacmanchar.com</u>) ahead of the schedule. This helps the prospective candidates from all over the districts to gain easy access to the admission process. Declaration of merit list on college notice board helps in maintaining transparency.

On the campus, counseling is provided to all the candidates approaching the counseling centre. This centre works round the clock during the admission period at a prominent location on the campus. Help and assistance is offered to all the students in selection of subjects with special attention being given to socially and physically challenged candidates. The college has made efforts to shift the balance of higher education from the 'teacher-centric education' to 'student-centric education', by supplementing the traditional learning practices, with the use of innovative learning techniques. This is made possible by conducting special Remedial Courses for the beginners in different subjects so as to bring them on par with the students who already have knowledge of these subjects. Teachers enrich the learning experience of the students, through subject association activities, such as group discussions, guest lectures, study tours, lecture / essay / poster competitions and class presentations. They make the learning process more interactive and dynamic with greater participation of students. Supplementing lectures with various teaching aids, such as demonstration apparatus, models, charts, slides and use of ICT. Teachers have developed their own e-resources in some subjects. Language Laboratory has been established for enhancing communication skills. Our parent organization (Rayat Shikshan Sanstha) has established "Karmaveer Vidhya Prabodhini", which offers various short term Certificate courses. These courses have picked up very well with modules available for beginners as well as advanced learners. Obtaining student feedback on the performance of teachers is a regular practice. The college is with



UGC-INFLIBNET for e-resource. The teachers have prepared their own course material in the form of e-resources. The learning experiences of our students are enriched through the activities organized by subject associations such as group discussions, guest lectures, study tours, lecture/essay/poster competitions and 'Wall Papers'. More emphasis has been placed on learning skills such as conducting surveys on social issues, data collection and presentation. With a view to sharpening the skills of our students, the college is continuously in the process of devising and evolving the evaluation system by making value additions to the common evaluation pattern offered by the university, which is qualitative and quantitative. Choice based credit system has been implemented for all post graduate programmes. This system is based on the performance of the students at viva voce, seminars, projects, group discussions, home assignments and open-book tests conducted at the departmental level. In keeping with the changes and aspirations of the young generation of students and their teachers, there are initiatives in terms of additions in infrastructure; facilitating adoption of ICT enabled teaching learning methods. The management has also been pro-active in investing on the necessary hardware and software. Qualified teaching staff: Ph.D.-06, M. Phil.-06 and P.G, NET/SET-21.All permanent faculty members have to undergo orientation and refresher courses. Institution encourages all the faculty members to do so to keep them up to date in their respective subjects. At present 19 Faculty members are doing their Ph.D.Minor and major research projects have been completed.Faculty members have participated and presented their research papers, in the State/National/International seminars, workshops, conferences and community programmes.

Criterion III: Research, Consultancy and Extension

There has been a substantial growth in the research work. Although the academic pressure of work is more on the faculty, some teachers have been publishing quality research work consistently in national and international peer reviewed journals. Ph.D. in Botany and Tissue Culture lab has been started. The Faculty members and students are involved in research work.Major Research Project worth Rs.10,83,000 and Minor Research Project of Rs.14,10,000/- have been sanctioned from UGC and BCUD funding agency. 22 Minor Research Projects worth Rs.66, 64,093/-have been completed and 16 Minor Research Projects are ongoing. In last 5 years, the number of papers presented in conferences are 140



and 265 papers have been published in national and international reputed journals. 241 faculties participated in seminar and conferences during the last five years. One of the faculty from the department of Chemistry presented a research paper in international conference at China and South Korea in 2011-2012. Another faculty from the department of Chemistry presented a research paper in international conference at Malaysia (Thailand). Principal of our college presented a research paper in international conference at Italy, Bangkok.during the year 2013-14. Faculty from the department of Zoology presented a research paper in international conference at Barcelona University (Spain) and Paris (France) during the year 2013-14.

Students participate in university level research competition Avishkar. The college magazine Shivneri secured Second Best Prize at University Level in 2012-13, First Best Prize at University Level in 2013-14, Second Best Prize at State Level in 2014-15, Second Best Prize at State Level-Yashvantrao Chavan Award-2015-16. One faculty from the department of Zoology got the prestigious award- "Shikshanratna" from Global Society, New Delhi. Another faculty from the department of Zoology got first prize in 'Poster presentation 'in the international conference. One faculty from the department of Economics got Best Teacher Award from R.C Shahumaharaj.Faculty from the department of Marathi got MASAPA A.V. Kulkarni - Award, Dhawal Gurugi Puraskar, Shetakari Sahitya Puraskar Shevgaon (Shivar Pratisthan, Aurangabad). The college annual publication, 'Shivneri' got State Level 2nd Prize in 2015. It also got 1st and 2nd Prizes in Savitribai Phule Pune University, in 2012 and in 2014 respectively. NSS and NCC are consistently active in various areas to help the community at large. One of the students was selected for RD parade at Mumbai. Collaboration with local industries, extension and socially relevant activities such as tree plantation, AIDS-awareness, traffic-alertness, health - hygiene programmes, workshops, blood donation camps, antidowry-drives, eradication of superstitions etc. are regularly organized. Consultancy is however informal and restricted to individuals.

Criterion IV: Infrastructure and Learning Resources

• The college has specious, well lit and ventilated classrooms and laboratories. There are 28 Classrooms, 1 Seminar hall, 9 Laboratories, 1 Research lab, 1 Indoor stadium,

1 Botanic Garden, Equipments for teaching and learning- 14 LCD Projectors , 6 Laptops, 5 OHP etc. available.

- A specious and well-furnished gymkhana office at one end of the playground. There are facilities for monitoring of sports activities and maintenance of high quality sport equipment and Infrastructure. There is indoor multipurpose hall with changing rooms. A well-equipped gymnasiumfor boys and girls for weight training, weight lifting, and power lifting, Table tennis, Chess and carom are available. Outdoor sports facilities on playground of the college include running track of 400 meters, Football and hockey grounds, two volleyball grounds, two Kho-Khogrounds, cricket pitch, hand ball ground, basketballcourt and open badminton court etc.Well-furnished office equipped with computer setup, printer, scanner and the tools and instruments campaign and labor activities. The NCC unit is run by 36 Maharashtra battalion NCC Pune.
- The academic work is carried out in the morning and evening shifts to ensure optimum use of infrastructure facilities.For Physical Disability Students College has constructed 5 ramps in Main Building, Library, Women's Hostel, Laboratory, Toilets etc.
- Hostel Facility is available for girl students. Residential facility for the staff. Constant supply of safe drinking water is available in the quarters, in the hostel and institute's buildings for the staff and the students.
- Complete health checkup of all the first year students of Arts, Science and commerce faculty done every year. One separate room is available for emergency medical help located at the botany department
- IQAC, Counseling and career guidance, Placement cell, Health center, Canteen, Auditorium with recreational spaces, Grievance Reddress all these units spaces facilities are available.
- The library has an advisory committee. The library has total number of books- 73132 and Subscription of NLIST with more than 3500 e-Journals and 83000 e-books from UGC's INFLIBENT. Central Library uses LIBREARIA Software designed and developed by MKCL.
- Number of computers are 155 with internet facility, Standalone facility, LAN facility Wi-Fi facility, Licensed software etc. are available.



- For maintenance, college prepares and submits financial requirements under various budget heads to our parent institution (Rayat Shikshan Santha) every year. The college LMC plays a monitoring roll on the expenditure under various budget heads.
- calibration of instruments is done regularly or as per the need by the expert faculty member in the respective department. The process followed for calibration is as per slandered methods.
- Sensitive equipment the voltage stabilizer available for emergency voltage equalizer. In addition to the common measures such as Installing inverters/UPS spike guards to take care of voltage fluctuations and voltage spikes. There one three phase central generator of capacities of 20 KVA. These are used during major power failures or during 'load shading 'period. Thus the sensitive equipment are provided with additional protection against voltage fluctuations with the help of such UPS/ inverters and by installing voltage stabilizer.

CriterionV: Student Support and Progression

In keeping with mission statement and the stated goals, the institute makes sincere efforts to provide modern education to youth of North Pune District region. It introduces new courses considering the need and employment opportunities. Every year the college disburses financial aid to students coming from economically weaker sections of the society. Financial assistance from state government, central government and other national agencies is given to the students. The college bears all the expenses such as travel, food, accommodation, equipment, special training etc. for the students representing in research, seminar, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities like Sports, Avishkar, NSS, NCC and Cultural programmes. The faculty members extend their support as mentors and team managers in all such activities. Medical assistance like health check up, health insurance etc. is provided to all students of the college. The college organizes Skill development (Spoken English, Soft Skills, Computer Literacy, etc) courses and coaching classes for competitive exams. Different Add-On courses have been effectively run especially by departments and have helped students for employment or higher studies.

The specific support services/facilities are made available for students from SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections, students with physical disabilities.

Criterion VI: Governance, Leadership and Management

- The college is governed by Rayat Shikshan Santha, Satara. The Governing Body (GB) and Local Managing Committee (LMC) provide general guidelines for quality policy to create a supportive atmosphere for teaching-learning process.
- The LMC along with IQAC monitors and evaluates all mechanisms of academic and administrative processes.
- The LMC and IQAC are concerned in communicating and reviewing the policies and action plans to all the stakeholders.
- The faculty is actively involved in academic decision making process through the various committees.
- The college authority has allotted adequate autonomy to the Vice Principals and the Heads of the Departments in order to attain smooth functioning of academic processes.
- The IQAC looks after the efficiency and effectiveness of various activities done in the college for the educational purposes. For every quality initiative, operational features are well planned before implementation.





The college introduced the following innovations to create a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

- The effective use of ICT practices in classroom and laboratories are practiced for effective and quick realization of the subject contain among the students.
- Automation and digitalization library is in progress.
- Active participation of students in research oriented programmes like Avishkar, Spectrum, Science Day organization and Bio-Tech exhibition for inculcation of scientific attitude among the masses.
- LAN and intercom facilities are provided to each and every department for effective communication among them.
- Use of computer software for the admission and results of UG, PG classes.
- Computer training programme conducted for faculty members.

- Physical Fitness (Yoga) Programme, Stress management programme conducted for all faculties.



- The Maharashtra State level special programme like "Jagar Janiwancha" for women empowerment and gender sensitization was arranged.
- Short Term Courses conducted for the development of commercial and social attitude among the students.
- Training for school teachers from catchment area was arranged in co-operation with our mother institution Rayat Shikshan Sanstha for RTS, MTS and GS.
- Departmental wall papers and college Magazine activities were conducted as means of communication and application of knowledge.
- Short Term skill oriented courses and Soft Skill Programme were organized for the benefit of students.

2.1 Student Enrollment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

i. Publicity of admission process:

a) Prospectus:

- College prepares updated prospectus which provides detailed information about the college regarding the courses offered, intake capacity, eligibility criteria for admission to each course, fee structure, documents necessary for the admission, etc.
- It enlists the subject combinations for three years B.A., B.Com., B.Sc., B.Sc. (Biotechnology) and B. C. A. Course as well as subject structure of two years M. A., M. Com. and M. Sc. is also mentioned.
- The prospectus also provides detailed information about academic as well as support facilities. The academic calendar, rules and regulations and prizes for rank holders are also mentioned in the prospectus.
- There is separate brochure for the UGC-sanctioned Career Oriented Courses (C.O.C.) offered by the College. It contains all the information about the courses. (Yet UGC grant is not received so courses are not started).

b) College Website:

The college has developed its website: <u>http://www.aacmanchar.com</u> for the convenience of students and parents. The website contains all the information mentioned in the prospectus as well as bio-data of faculty and day to day events.

c) Print media:

The college regularly publishes advertisements about admissions in leading regional newspapers. Whenever new courses or subjects are introduced, the college publishes the advertisements in leading regional newspapers like "Sakal", "Lokmat" newspapers.





Posters, hoardings, banners and handbills: For the first year B.C.A. and Biotech admission the college prepares posters, hoardings and banners which contain detail information of programmes and courses offered. Handbills for the same are distributed by the members of faculty in the near-by colleges.

Student counseling: The admission committee guides students about admission process and other aspects.

ii) Transparency in admission process:

The College follows all the norms for admission laid down by Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune and Government of Maharashtra. The admissions are given on the basis of the previous qualifying examinations. There is no provision to give admissions to UG (B.A./ B.Com./B.Sc./ B.Sc. (Biotechnology) courses on the basis of entrance test in our University. The admission is given to the student from the socially backward strata and economically weaker section.

It follows the guidelines regarding reservation to the backward classes. In order to ensure transparency, the merit list is displayed on notice board and ample time is given to getadmission. The closing date of admission as per University/ College guidelines is also displayed. Thus the College ensures transparency in the admission process.

Admission to UG and PG Courses:

• The admissions are given on the basis of the previous qualifying examinations. There is no provision to give admissions to UG (B.A./B.SC./B.Com./B.Sc.

(Biotechnology) courses on the basis of entrance test in our University. For UG and PG Courses, admissions are given on merit basis. The college prepares merit list for the admission of first year B.A, B.Com, B.Sc., BCA and post graduate courses. The admission is strictly based on marks of the previous examination. The registration forms are scrutinized by the members of admission committee and merit lists are prepared and displayed on notice board and ample time is given to the students to get the admissions. Waiting list for the remaining vacant seats is displayed on the notice board.

- Reservation polices and directives of the State Government and the University are strictly followed by the college.
- Separate admission committee is formed by the College for UG and PG courses. The committee guides the students about the registration and admission process. It also provides information about the courses offered by the College.

Admission to Career Oriented Courses:

There is provision to take admission for Career Oriented Courses, on first come first serve basis. In case of the Certificate Courses, interested students may obtain any course of their choice.

2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating university within the city/district.

The minimum and maximum percentage of marks at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college and comparison with two colleges of the affiliated to the Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune which is in the nearby locality. The maximum and minimum percentage of marks of students admitted during the academic year 2011-2012 to 2015-16 shows the merit cut off is nearly equal to other colleges despite of the fact that the college is located in rural area.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes' what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

Yes, there is a mechanism to review the admission process and student profiles, apart from regular activity carried on by the college. The admission committee reviews the





qualitative standard of the students. The entire process ensures the transparency in the admissions.

- All the faculty members of the college also take part in admission procedure. The entire process of the admission is carried out under the supervision of admission committee.
- The committee helps the students for the selection of special subject, optional subjects and one of the career oriented programmes so as to make the process effective and transparent.
- With the help of Vriddhi software, the college office provides a general profile of the enrolled students to the admission committee and faculty.
- General profile: It is prepared to find out the social and economic background of the students, so that maximum students can avail the facilities provided by the college.
- **Gender based profile:** To find out the progression of the number of girls students, gender based profile is prepared.
- **Caste wise profile:** It is prepared to find out the strength of students of SC, ST, NT and OBC. With the help of this profile students are made aware of various scholarships and free ships.

Outcome of admission process and preparation of student profile

While taking review of the admission process and student profile it shows that the college gives admission to divers' students which belong to SC, ST, NT, OBC, economically weaker students. Based on this information, the students are guided for various free ships, scholarships, earn and learn scheme, remedial coaching, bridge courses and short term courses.


SC and ST

- As the students for SC & ST category get their tuition fees from the government, at time of admission, college takes minimum fees excluding tuition fees from these students, so that these students get attracted for admission and their strength gets increased. In critical cases, the college level fee is excused.
- The college admission committee guides the students at the time of admission and during course programme. The college also helps the students to fill online scholarship forms, and enable them to avail the scholarships.
- The faculty regularly follows up for the scholarships with the concerned person. The admission committee of the college also monitors the admission process of reserved seats for various courses.



- The college has taken continuous efforts which have resulted in excellent admission rate growth of girl students as is evident in the table given below.



- Insurance facility is provided to the students by the university in case of any accident.






• The college provides installment facility for submission of fees to the students.

The foundation of our education society is based on the motto of serving all sections of society and in particular uplifting the weaker sections of the society. Thus, the outlook of the education society believes into being an inclusive education society while at the same time respecting the feelings, culture backgrounds of all communities and religions. The education society believes in the principles of respect and freedom for all community, religion and classes to live accordingly to their beliefs, culture and values. This is in tune with our constitution which has enunciated equality, liberty and fraternity for all. Strategies adopted by the college for promotion of access to students from disadvantaged community.

The details of the scholarships are displayed on the notice board and enumerated in prospectus and website. The committee promotes awareness amongst students for availability of scholarships, cutoff dates, filling online applications for scholarships and follows up of the grants of scholarships and facilitates granting of scholarships to such students.

Sports personnel: The college provides two percent seats of the intake capacity for each course to sports students in the first year admission process and also provides financial support to such students.

Trend observed

- The number of applicants shows increasing trend of growing demand for the courses offered by the college.

- The enrollment of SC, ST, OBC students is gradually increasing during last five years.
- The ratio of girl students has increased in all programmes except 2015-16.

Action taken by the college

• The college takes efforts on publicity of PG courses in other Universities also.



- Members of faculty take special efforts to encourage girl students to pursue higher education. For this, various activities are conducted in the college and also safety and security is assured to the girl students.
- Members of all the faculty, counsel students and parents individually at the time of admission.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently- abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

- The management, the Principal, teaching and non-teaching staff extend help to the differently-abled students during admission process and throughout the course. The college affords comfort to such students at formal as well as informal level.
- The Principal and our management do not encourage any type of discrimination towards the differently abled students. These students get equal opportunities in all aspects of academics and extracurricular activities.
- The college provides comfortable environments and additional facilities such as book bank for differently-able students.

Efforts taken by the college to cater needs of differently-able students

- The college has provided a ramp at the entrance for comfortable access to the physically challenged students.
- In the reading room, special seating arrangement is provided to such students.
- For differently-able students, examinations are conducted at convenient place. For visually challenged students, extra time is given as per the university norms.
- As a part of our institutional social responsibility, fee concession is also provided differently- able students.
- The college ensures equality among all students and there is no feeling of alienation from other students.
- 2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.



YES, Institution has such assessment programme, details are as follows:

Assessment of student needs: The college is assertive to provide various ways to assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills to prepare a positive mind-set of students towards the new course.

- Every year the Principal of the college conveys through his induction programme 'Abhibhashan', to all first year students. Through this programme the Principal provides information regarding various committees, their chairpersons and their different activities, layout and key features of the college campus and an introduction of all the teaching and non-teaching staff to create a sense of belonging towards the college among the new students. This also helps them to adjust quickly in a new campus with a new environment.
- We consider XIIth standard marks of students as the first indicator to identify slow and advanced learners.
- Interaction with the students also helps to understand their knowledge about the subjects.
- Through a student mentoring programme the class teacher guides and provide counseling a group of students selected under his/her mentorship, which helps to closely observe and monitor the students.
- 2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/ Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

Bridging the knowledge gap of students:

Raising the bar for the students by conducting advanced test giving them extra knowledge and making them competent with students of other college. Some of the common strategies include:

- Once the analysis of the students is done based on the XIIth standard marks in the initial phase of their admission process the knowledge gap and level of grasping knowledge is ascertained for each student. Accordingly the strategies are devised for weak and meritorious students.
- For slow learners remedial teaching, extra lectures of Accountancy, Mathematics, English



- Under the quality improvement programmes, guest lectures, seminars and workshops are organized for the students regularly.
- The various departments of the college organize study tours and visits to industries, banks, market areas, malls, agricultural based business institutions, cottage industries, IT and various other industries. These visits help the students to bridge the gap between theory and practical.
- Most of the students being from vernacular background face the difficulty of understanding the subjects because of basic lack of knowledge of English language. From the very beginning these students are given spoken English course as the compulsory course. This not only enhances their language skills but also gives them a lot of confidence to face global challenge.
- The college also organizes bridge courses in BCA. They provide knowledge to students those coming from other faculty such as D.Ed., M.C.V.C., Arts and Commerce.

Remedial teaching for SC/ST/NT/OBC/minority

- Remedial lecture series are organized especially for SC/ST/NT/ OBC/minority students for better understanding of subjects like English, Mathematics and Accountancy in which the students are generally found to be weak. In the eleventh plan of UGC, the college received 10, 00,000 /- amount.
- It has been always the directives of our Managing Executive Committee and the Principal to give a lot of emphasis on guiding socio-economically weak students so that they can come at par with the other students in the subjects they are weak in.
- The college has Parent-Teacher Scheme. The role of which is for the faculty to act as a parent-guardian to the students belonging to socioeconomically weaker group of community, girls coming from rural areas, and also slow learners. This is done with the intention that the class-teachers can guide these students to uplift them academically and also enrich them individually.

Add-on/enrichment courses

- In the college, under career oriented programmes, Twenty Five Short Term Coursesare designed by the faculty members. These courses are curriculum based, value addition and skill oriented i.e. Beauty parlor and Fashion design.
- To encourage the students for competitive examinations like MPSC and UPSC, special coaching is provided to the aspiring students. In the eleventh plan, University Grant Commission has sanctioned 1,80000/- (Career counseling) and 6,00,000/- (Coaching classes for entry in services for SC/ST/OBC and Minority) amount on competitive coaching classes.
- 2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

As the college had been founded in a predominantly rural area through the years the students were predominantly from rural background. Hence, the college faculties and the sanstha had to put in a lot of efforts to change the mind-set of the students. So a lot of emphasis and efforts have been taken to ensure equal treatment and opportunities to girl students, a message of unbiased treatment and encouragement to girl students has always been one of the key aspects of this college. The institute organizes gender sensitization, women empowerment programmes, inclusive growth and activities focusing on environmental conservation and protection. Some of which are enumerated below.

Gender sensitization programmes Security to girl students:

• The college invites resource persons belonging to various non-government organizations (NGOs), working on gender sensitization and inclusion in the society to create awareness among the students.





- Anti-ragging, discipline, committee for harassment against women (Vishakha committee) work together to provide a sense of security to girl students in the campus.
- The college has facility of closed circuit television (CCTV) camera for the vigilance in the campus.

Health issues:

- The college organizes lectures on health, diet, body anatomy, sex education.
- The college has organized blood group and Haemoglobin check-up camps for girl students and also for women, belonging to deprived areas of society through NSS and Students health center.
- Health awareness programmes are organized especially for girls and women under *Jagar Janivancha Abhiyan*.

Personality development: The college encourages the girl students to participate in various programmes like personality development, soft skills development, *Nirbhay Kanya Abhiyan*, debating, elocution and cultural activities.

Social awareness: To create legal awareness among girl students, the college organizes workshops and lectures of reputed personalities from police department and judiciary to educate the girl students.

To provide Self-employment: The college runs Twenty Five Short Term Courses various self-employment courses under career oriented programmes for girls. Short term courses such as Fashion Designing/Tourism, Domestic Electrical Appliance, Programming in C & C++, Plant Tissue Culture Tech., Carrer Prospects in Chemistry, Information Technology, Spoken English, Event Management, Certificate Course in Archeology, Journalism, A Certificate Course in Self Employment & Enter. Dev., House Hold Chemicals, Personality Development, Beauty Parlor(Out of 25,18 Students have Scholarship), Direct Taxes, A Certificate Course in Computerized Account Writing, Soft Skill Development, A Certificate Course in Aptitude Test, A Certificate Course in Hardware & Networking, Solid Waste Management. The college has also organized



special visits to self-employment institutions, only for girl students to inculcate entrepreneurship quality in them.

To provide Self-confidence

- Faculty members recognize potential of girl students and motivate them to use their ability and raise their self-confidence. NSS, NCC and Gymkhana committee gives training of Judo and karate to girl students for self-defense.
- In academics the female students are encouraged to compete with the male students and it has been found that due to motivation by the faculty the confidence of the girl students has not only increased but they are found to be out performing the boys in number of fields.
- Girl Students Welfare Committee always provides platform to girls share their views and raise their confidence level.

Financial assistance: Financial help to the girls is provided through earn and learn scheme, freeships and various scholarships.

Jagar Janivancha Abhiyan organized by the State Government of Maharashtra and Savitribai Phule Pune University Pune Since last two years, the college has been organizing a unique event namely 'Jagar Janivancha Abhiyan' through which gender sensitization, gender inclusion, equality, self-employment guidance, self-defense training, lectures of eminent and well known women personalities from society are arranged for girl students. This committee also organizes health awareness, diet consciousness, and blood haemogram and blood group check-up camps for women belonging to deprived areas in the vicinity of the college.

Gender inclusion:

It has always been in the fore front of the objective of the sanstha and this has been realized by increase in the number of girl students seeking admission through the years. Special drives are always initiated to encourage girl students to seek admission and also complete their education.

Inclusive growth programmes undertaken by the college

- NSS volunteers survey the village for literacy rate, availability of life essential resources, population parameter, girls-boys sex ratio, mal- nutrition in children.
- NSS volunteers have undertaken the programme of continuous contours trenching (CCTV) to harvest rain water and they have been successful in converting the barren hill into lush and environmentally rich hill near college campus. Also as a result of which, the water level of the college water bore has increased.



- Organises career and competitive examinations guidance lectures for students free of cost under UGC programme.
- Best and enriched environment to girls, socio-economically deprived students, reserved category students for building confidence and to create social awareness.
- Parent-teacher meeting is organized for proactive interactions for confidence building and promoting the cause of education among them. The parents are convinced to continue the education of their daughters.
- 2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?
 - Based on the HSC percentage and interaction with the faculty in and out of the classroom, students are classified as slow and advanced learners.
 - Observation of student's performance and oral test results during practicals are also help for identifying slow and advanced learners.
 - Response given by students during teaching-learning interaction during the initial sessions.

Facilities provided to advanced learners

- Reference books are given to advanced learners from central and departmental library.
- To fulfill advanced learners academic appetite, lectures of eminent persons, academicians, scientists, workshops, seminars, and conferences are organized by the college under Quality Improvement Programme and special guidance scheme of the University of Pune.
- Coaching for competitive examinations is provided to advanced learners.
- The college reschedules internal examinations for advance learners who missed the examinations due to participation in co-curricular, extracurricular activities in the other colleges and Universities.
- The advanced learners are given exposure to different processes by arranging visits to various organizations.
- Faculty members also encourage the advanced learners to represent the college in debates, quiz competitions organized in the other colleges.
- Advanced learners are also encourages to opt for different scholarships.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically





challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

The institution takes continuous efforts to help or to solve the problems of students from the disadvantaged section, physically challenged, slow learner, economically weaker sections. Though the dropout rate of the students for UG and PG programme is low, the college always takes positive efforts to minimize dropout rates.

Collection, Analysis and use of Primary data

- The college has Vriddhi software through which faculty gets complete information of students with respect to gender, caste, socio-economical background.
- The college provides this information to all respective class teachers.
- The subject teachers observe students during the course duration to know difficulties the students face during learning process.
- Effective monitoring on regular basis.
- Counseling of the students for social, psycho issues by sociologists and psychologists.

Students from disadvantaged sections of society/physically challenged

Through Parent-Teacher Scheme the class teachers and members of faculty analyze and use these data to identify the students, and form groups of twenty students each of students like slow learners, physically challenged, socio economically weaker students which require special attention.

- The class teachers guide these students for academic and extra-curricular activities.
- Members of faculty pay attention to such students through personal and career counseling programmes.
- The remedial classes are conducted for academically weaker students wherever necessary.
- The college provides information of various freeships, scholarships available for SC/ST/OBC/minority/physically challenged and girls' students.
- Student counseling: Members of faculty give personal attention in the development of students especially girl students and motivate them for higher education; hence the dropout rate is minimal.





Economically weaker section

The college teachers provide information regarding freeships and scholarships to economically backward students.

- The college provides installment facility for paying fees.
- Economically weaker students get freeships and the college also gives relaxation in fees. Faculty members motivate such students to enroll in the Earn and Learn scheme of the Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune.
- The college encourages such students to get Government scholarships and helps them in the process of getting scholarships and motivates them to continue their education.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

- 2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)
 - The college has constituted academic planning committee, extra-curricular and examination committees for planning of the teaching-learning and evaluation schedules.

Academic Calendar: Academic calendar is updated year wise on the college website.

- Field visits, industrial visits and study tour tentative schedules.

- Holidays schedule declared by the Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune and the State Government.
- Schedule of YCMOU activities such as admission, teaching programmes and examination.
- Schedule of cultural activities.
- Remedial and bridge courses.
- Career oriented courses.



Teaching Plan

- Each faculty member prepares teaching plan.
- At the end of semester, members of faculty submit completion report of syllabus to the Head of the department and in charge of the faculty.
- Members of faculty also maintain daily lecture notes in the given format by the college.

Evaluation: Internal evaluation

- Faculty members conduct tutorials, home assignments, viva voce, and question paper solving for all the courses.
- Some faculty members evaluate students by conducting seminars and group discussion.
- As per the University schedule, the college conducts term end examinations for B.A., B.Com, BCA, M.A. and M.Com. students.
- For first, second and third year B.Sc. and B.Sc. (Biotechnology) students' internal evaluation tests are conducted.
- For PG courses Choice based credit system is now implemented as per the University guidelines.

Semester examination

- For second and third year B.Sc., B.C.A., B.Sc. (Biotechnology) and M.A., M.Com. M.Sc., semester pattern is followed as per the University guidelines.
- It is compulsory to prepare project report on study tour which is evaluated by the examiner during practical examination.
- Results of internal examinations are displayed on notice board within the period of forty five days from the date of examination.

Annual examination

- For second and third year of B.A. and B.Com. annual examination is conducted by the University.
- As per the University rule B.C.A. and B.Sc. (Biotech.) up to 2014-15 students undertake project work which carries hundred marks.



- Since 2010, annual examination for first year B.A., B.Com., B.Sc. and B.Sc. (Biotech.) is conducted by the college and 80-20 pattern is followed as per the University guidelines.
- The University results are displayed on notice board and also made available for faculty members. The college results are compared with the University results. Good results are appreciated and justifications reasoning for average results is analysed and concerned teachers are advised to improve the results by taking extra efforts.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process?

The IQAC plays a key role in planning and monitoring of all the academic related activities. Each department has to submit its report to the IQAC. The IQAC reviews and analyses the reports obtained from individual departments for further action. The IQAC finalizes and approves the activities of the different committees, and then these activities are implemented by the heads of respective committees.

Role played by IQAC in teaching learning process: Major duties of the IQAC:

Planning, impementing the planned programms, monitoring and getting feedback

- This cell encourages and monitors facilities for using ICT in teaching.
- Student feedback on teacher's performance, course, library, sports, office and hostel are duly noted by IQAC.
- IQAC stimulates the faculty to use diverse teaching methods to enhance the process of learning.
- Overall feedback of the college is obtained from parents is also analysed by IQAC.
- Minutes of Staff and all departmental meetings, implementation of timetable, teaching plan, daily lecture records are noted by IQAC.
- Sanctioning evaluation or examination schedule is put forth by examination committee.



- Results of all the programmes are evaluated and based on these departments with good results are congratulated while departments with poor or below average results are encouraged to improve their results.
- IQAC encourages different departments to arrange guest lectures under quality improvement programme of the Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune or UGC.
- IQAC monitors and assists different departments in organization of seminars, workshops, and conferences.
- IQAC encourages members of faculty for various faculty development programmes such as participation in orientation, refresher, workshops, seminars and conferences for updating the subject knowledge of members of faculty.
- Assistance and Guidance in the preparation of Self-Study Report (SSR) of the college for getting reaccredited by NAAC.
- Student feedback committee submits report to the IQAC.
- 2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?
 - Faculty members are taking focused efforts to make learning experience more interesting for the students. It provides a smooth learning curve. For this purpose member of faculty uses conventional as well as modern interactive learning techniques; hence the teaching becomes more student centric.
 - Traditional learning method is supplemented by ICT method.
 - Learning is made student centric by use of interactive and collaborative techniques such as

Interactive learning

- The IQAC has advised all the members of the faculty to make the lecture sessions totally interactive where as students participation in the class room is exhorted.
- Use of Bio-Visual charts, maps, periodic tables, flow charts, diagrams in class rooms.
- Use of overhead projectors, LCD projectors, computer technology and internet to provide visual perspective to the respective subject.
- Use of Lingua phones to improve communication skills.



- Seminars, power point presentations, group discussions, and co-operative learning sessions are organized to make the subject more accessible and understandable for the students.
- Articles from newspapers, Annuals, reputed journals are showcased on departmental notice board.
- Members of faculty encourage students to collect subject related information from various resources, for information about noble laureates, great economists, historic places and events.
- Guest lectures are organized by members of faculty.
- Faculty members inspire students to prepare models, charts, sheets, practical manuals of the subject.
- Objective and subjective question banks are prepared by the teachers and students also.
- Parent teacher scheme, concentrate on individual student progress from the group of twenty students.
- Organization of field and industrial visits and study tours helps to make students aware about small scale business, self-employment and also motivates towards entrepreneurship ventures.
- Commerce faculty encourages and motivates the students towards entrepreneurship by visiting banks, market places and markets.
- Geography and History departments organize study tours to visit different geographically and historically important places.
- Zoology and Botany students visit bio-diversity areas and different ecosystems to get a practical perspective of the subject.
- Chemistry department organizes visits to industries, waste water treatment plants, fermentation technology and sugar industries.
- Geography and History departments involve their students in conducting surveys.
- Faculty motivate students especially girl students to take part in value courses, self -defense training.
- Students are encouraged by the faculty members to participate in research projects and activities like '*Avishkar*'.
- Students are encouraged to participate in the University / State / National / International seminars/Workshops/conferences organized by the college.



Collaborative learning

- IQAC has developed collaboration with some departments which help the students to carry out research projects.
- Study tours are organized to various institutes, agro-based industries through which students get practical knowledge of respective subjects.

Independent learning

Environmental awareness projects: Second year students of B.A., B.Com., B.Sc. and B.Sc.(Biotech) prepare project on various environmental issues under the guidance of the teachers. This is mandatory for all the students. The college provides Internet facility and reading room to the students.

Bio-diversity day celebration:

- Ways of inculcating independent learning among students are implemented through making wall Annual, internet searching and reference books.
- The students publicize their own poems and articles in the college Annual 'Shivaneri'.
- The students prepare question banks based on the topics and solve the questions. The teachers correct those papers as per student's needs.
- 2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

To inculcate scientific attitude and rational thinking among the students and society the college has taken lots of efforts. Some of the activities, undertaken by the college are as follows

Critical thinking

 NSS students and faculty members have motivated the women and help them to eradicate alcohol production and addiction materials.

Scientific attitude



- For promotion of research culture among the students and the staff, the college has established well equipped research laboratory for commerce and science faculty.
- Second year student of arts, commerce and science collect information about environmental issues and submit their projects to respective faculty.
- All the members of faculty assign project works to students to inculcate research attitude.
- Students get knowledge through short term courses such asbeauty parlor, fashion designing, Tally ERP 9, horticulture, vermiculture technology, travels and tourism, computer hardware and maintenance course.
- Every year our students actively participate in research project competition *Avishkar'*, organized by the Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune.
- Our students also participate in various college and the University level competitions such as scientific rangoli, quiz, seminar, poster and paper presentation competitions.
- Our students under the leadership of N.S.S. volunteers, botany department, earn and learn scheme are involved in activities like tree plantation, campus beautification, and waste management, identification of plants with their socioeconomical and medicinal importance.
- Since establishment of the college our faculty members including Principal actively work in the field of anti-superstition activity.
- The college has organized various anti-superstition activities such as workshops, and seminars on 'scientific attitude and rational thinking', lectures on scientific temperaments, scientific experiments and rallies.

To develop creativity

- A student of Physics participated in summer school in Physics at S. P. Pune University.
- Faculty and students have developed a beautiful Botanical garden, tree plantation project, medicinal plants project, custard apple, guava, papaya, tamarinds, moringa, mango, amla, coconut orchard on a barren land located in college campus. The students make wall Annuals which are related to the recent topics of the subjects, under Arts, literary, Commerce and Science association.





- Students write poems and articles on various topics on their own and the college publishes in the college Annual "Shivaneri" every year.
- 2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective Virtual laboratories, e-learning resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

The college has made available modern technologies to faculty for teaching and the members of faculty ensure optimum use of these facilities.

The facilities provided are listed below

- The college is registered with INFLIBNET facility. The library has provided login number to access INFLIBNET service through internet to staff and the students.
- The library has 500 books related to communication skills and these books have been made available to students.
- The library provides facility of e-books and e- journals on various subjects for the use of the faculty and students.
- The library has 500 books related to various competitive examinations.
- Newspapers, journals, reference books, and research papers are available for members of faculty and students.
- Science and B.C.A. faculties regularly use resources for effective teaching available by national programme on technology enhanced learning (NPTEL) and national mission on education through information and communication technology (NME-ICT).
- The college has one hundred fifty five computers, three laptops, fourteen LCD projectors, nine printers, one Scanner, one copier and three overhead projector and two servers.
- All departments are provided with a computer and printer with internet facility.
- The college has provided BSNL broad band (4mbps). An internet facility is available to all faculty and students.
- Some departments use educational CD's, VCD's, Audio cassettes; you tube videos, video clips, and movies related to subjects. The college library has 150 CD's and audio cassettes, 50VCD's and movies.



- The college has one audio visual rooms, provided with computer, LCD projector, speakers and internet.
- Faculty uses ICT resources such as internet, power point presentation, and excels to teach students effectively.
- Chemistry and BCA department faculty use software such as SQL, MS-office, c-programming++, java, oracle, visual basic 6.0, vb.net 2008.
- Some departments use social media sites like face book to share power point presentations of some topics with students.
- For effective English teaching and learning, the college has established language laboratory, 250 audio cassettes and CD's, are available to students for improving their communication skills. Software Goals language and Digital language.
- PG programmes have departmental library facilities, so that the reference books are regularly available for students.
- Innovative teaching methods such as models, maps, photographs are made available.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

The college motivates faculty to pursue higher qualification or mandatory qualifications (SET and NET, Ph.D. M. Phil.). The college makes all efforts to organiz professional and research attitude among members of faculty and students. The faculty and students are exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills in the following ways:

Faculty

- All permanent faculty members have to undergo orientation and refresher courses. Institution encourages all the faculty members to do so to keep them up to date in their respective subjects.
- At present 19 Faculty members are doing their Ph.D.
- 11 Minorresearch projects have been completed and 16 projects are on-going (2011-2015).
- Faculty members have participated and presented their research papers, in the State/National/International seminars, workshops, conferences and community

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/ mentoring / academic advise) provided to students?

The college has an admission committee, which guides the students to choose appropriate courses. The committee member personally talks to students, make them





comfortable, and then try to identify the aptitude of the students; they encourage students to select the subject as per their interest, aptitude and previous performance. This committee also advises the students regarding scope and opportunities of the subject and the future of the course. The students coming from socio-economically disadvantaged groups, girl students and minority students are given free ships, installment facility on the recommendation. Our students especially girl students are first generation learners, so all faculty give them personal and psycho-social support through counseling sessions.

Moral support and counseling:

Group counseling or guidance service

- Through the Parent teacher scheme the class teachers identify group of disadvantaged students, those who need moral and psychological support throughout the year. B.C.A. and Biotechnology faculty members arrange special counseling programmes before commencement of admission process.
- Special lectures of well-known psychologists, gynecologists, physicians, human rights and lawyers are organized by the college.
- The college has a career counseling and placement cell, which undertook various activities related to career counseling and career guidance under UGC eleventh plan.

Individual Counseling

- The faculty members also guide students in choosing various skills and career oriented courses, which are organized by the college.
- The faculty members play the role of mentors for students. Academic advice and counseling is given to slow and advanced learners by faculty as per their need.
- COP committee and competitive examination committee members guide students and prepare them to excel opportunities in respective areas.
- The competitive examination committee guides the students and prepares them for MPSC and UPSC examinations.
- The career counseling and placement cell caters to the needs of students regarding employment. The cell organizes campus interviews and job fairs for campus selection.
- At individual level members of faculty also guide and give economical support to the scholar from an economically backward section.





Social Support: Most of the girl students come from villages where importance of education especially for girls is neglected. This is set right by providing a sense of awareness among them during admission process and meetings. A sense of security is provided to these girls inside the college campus by adopting following measures:

The college has installed CCTV cameras. The college is in CCTV surveillance

The complaint box is maintained in college carried or with co operation of police department. The police periodically look after and eradicate their complaints.

VISHAKHA Committee: The college has also established 'VISHAKHA' committee which is mandatory according to the State Government norms. The college has established committee against women harassment for protection of girl students and female staff in the college campus. The committee is headed by senior women faculty members.

Grievance Redressal Cell: This committee of college helps the students for an enjoyable learning in the college campus. In the prominent places of the college, suggestion and complaint boxes are kept which can be used by students to report their suggestions and complaints. The committee analyses the suggestions and takes necessary action promptly. There are no substantial grievances in college campus.

Anti-ragging and Discipline Committee: These committees are always vigilant to prevent ragging and other anti-social practices in the college campus. Not a single case of ragging has been witnessed and/or reported in the college.

Girls' Welfare Committee has been organizing blood group and haemoglobin checking camps for girl students. Special guidance was given to girls having iron deficiency.

Bahishal Committee (Extra Mural Education): This committee organizes lecture series for the college students as well as for senior citizens. This again is in tune with the trust's objectives of social welfare and social commitment.

Health services: Themedical check-up committee organizes compulsory health checkup camps for all first year and hostel students, and also counsels them on health and hygiene by inviting experts.





Monetary support: Earn and learn scheme supports the students to take care of the educational expenses. In last Five years372 boys and girlsworked in this scheme and received Rs. 1461550/- amount.

Faculty of the college on their own volition helps the socio-economically weaker students financially as per their mite. The college provides installment facility to students on their request. The college gives concession in fees to physically challenged students as well as economically backward students.



Multimedia learning: A huge information and knowledge is now available on various media, such as internet sites, You tube, e-journals, e-books. This information is customized and power point presentations are prepared by the faculty members. Commercial and scientific video clips, movies are shown to students. Such efforts of the faculty members motivate students to pay more attention and memorize the topics.





Efforts by the Institution

- The college provides all essential facilities to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches.
- The members of the faculty regularly use ICT as an aid such as Power point presentations, interactive and co-operative learning through class room, discussions to promote attention and interest of the students.
- The college has specially designed one audio visual rooms with LCD projectors.
- Multimedia facilities such as 150 CD's, 50 VCDs and movies are available in library to enhance learning experience of students. Short clips and Movie clips are shown to the students based on relevant topics.
- Organization of student seminars on assigned topics.
- Use of ICT as an aid to promote attention and interest of the students.
- Use of models and charts, flow sheet diagrams and figures.
- Interactive learning through class room discussions.
- Co-operative learning and independent learning.
- Group discussions, role playing, project based learning, experiential learning are also the other approaches adapted by faculty.
- **OER** (**Open education resources**) The library conducts faculty training for staff and PG students to teach use N-list.
- Institution provides broad band internet facilities to all departments.
- Library is also provided with server and two computers, printer, identity card machine and photocopy machine.

Impact on student learning

- Learning process has become simpler, comprehensible and interesting.
- Student's attendance has shown gradual increase.



- Student's involvement and interaction during lectures has increased.
- Students are motivated for independent learning and option for higher education.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching- learning process?

The college library has well organized, spacious, clean infrastructure with provision of a separate reading room for students and staff.

- The library is well equipped and has large number of reference books, textbooks, journals and periodicals which help the students to expand their horizons beyond the classroom. The teachers also refer these books for extra knowledge and better understanding of modern advancements related to their subject/topic.
- Library books are updated weekly.
- Reading Room facilties for the regular students and separate for the students preparaing for competitive examinations.
- New books and journals are displayed on student notice board and on the racks for the student information.
- The librarian collects list of new books from Annuals, local newspapers, and internet and makes a preference list while borrowing of books which enables to keep an optimum and hassle-free interaction between librarian and the students.
- The library also provides INFLIBNET which grants the students and teachers access to various e-journals and e-resources. The library faculty encourages the use of INFLIBNET by students and teachers.
- The library staff creates a congenial atmosphere for reading in library to facilitate the use of the library.
- The college also provides a special section in the library for accessing books in Braille for visually impaired students. Library also provides book bank facility to minority, SC, ST, NT, OBC and girl as well as scholar students.
- Students are able to avail the use of reading room on demand during the examination period to promote group study and interactive understanding.

• Students are allowed to use departmental library for easy access to maximum number of reference books.



- The post graduate departments provide downloaded e-books for students and researchers.
- All PG students are given password to access N-list programmes.
- 2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

Yes, The Academic planning committee and IQAC prepare an academic calendar prior to commencement of the academic year. This enables the college to arrange extracurricular and co-curricular activities in accordance with the academic/teaching schedule. The curriculum is always completed by the faculty within the given time frame. However, whenever a circumstance arises due to Casual Leave, Duty Leave or medical leave of members of faculty, following measures are taken to resolve them.

- Arrangement of extra lectures with provision of a schedule for them on Sundays, holidays or after the college lectures.
- An extra practical batch is also conducted in available time; in case practical syllabus is lagging.
- Adjustment of lectures with other members of faculty to cover-up on completion of syllabus.
- In case of any contingencies, the time table is revised to meet the deadlines.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

The IQAC and examination department monitors and evaluates the quality of teaching and learning. Following are different programs executed by these committees for evaluation purposes.

Monitoring system

The Principal along with IQAC and in-charge of all faculties monitor the conduct of faculty in classes and during practical and keep a record of classes missed by the teachers. The concern teachers are asked to conduct the missed lectures.

The IQAC conducts midterm meetings to review the progress in teaching learning and to work out a solution to help out low performing students.

Evaluation system



- Student feedback committee collects feedback from students on (punctuality, teaching ability) course, library, sports, office, hostel. This committee analyses and evaluates the performance for the same.
- The IQAC, based on the student feedback, gives suggestions to concerned teachers.
- After declaration of examination results, the examination department analyses class wise results and the information is provided to Principal of the college.
- The IQAC provides the members of faculty with a letter of appreciation or of improvement based upon the performance of students under the guidance of faculty.

2.4 Teacher Quality

2.4.1 Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the college in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human resource (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum.

Prior to getting minority status, the recruitment of the human resources was done strictly according to the legal statutes of the University, Directorate of higher education, UGC, and the State Government prescribed norms. The advertisement stating the recruitment post specifications, based upon the norms fixed by the Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune, Director of higher education, the State Government and UGC, was published in various local, regional newspapers and institutional website after sanctioning of posts and roster by the Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune. The Sanstha has recruited and maintained staff of qualified, experienced and competent teachers. For the selection of full time posts, the Sanstha authority advertises in newspapers. The Management appoints a qualified and experienced selection committee to select the candidate from the pool of candidates responding to the advertisement.

The selection committee consists of the following members

- Representative of management
- Two subject experts from the other colleges
- Principal of the college
- Head of the concerned department.

The Sanstha conducts the interview as per statutes and norms of the Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune and Government of Maharashtra. The eligible and competent candidates are selected by the selection committee. After selection, the management appoints the selected candidates. If no eligible candidate has applied or appeared for interviews, then selection committee may recruit qualified but non-eligible candidate (i.e. without SET, NET or Ph. D. qualification). These candidates are selected on temporary basis for the academic year. The college has self-financed programmes like B.C.A. and Biotechnology, at UG level and M.Sc., M.Com, M.A. at PG level.

Staff can avail loan which is disbursed very quickly and can be repaid in easy installments. Loan such as General loan- Rs. 10,00000, Emergency loan- Rs. 3,00,000, Festival loan- Rs. 1,00,000, Housing loan- Rs.40,00,000, Higher Purchase loan- Rs. 5,00,000, Education Loan- Rs. 10,00,000.
- The college caters all facilities for the students' security. It has special helpline for women where they can inform about any type of harassment.
- Awards are given to non-teaching staff every year.
- Research work is promoted among members of faculty by the college by ensuring that the members of faculty involved in any such research are granted freedom within the norms set by the UGC regarding expenditure of their research grants. 2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand/ scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes/ modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced?

The college has introduced new programmes like B.C.A., B.Sc. (Biotechnology) and M.Sc. in organic chemistry, M. A. and M.Com. For recruitment of qualified and eligible candidates the Sanstha has followed the method specified according to the norms, legal status. For M. A., M. Com. and M.Sc. course the college has appointed qualified and eligible candidates to cope with the growing demand of emerging Programmes. The college faces the problem of getting qualified and eligible staff for teaching the new emerging programmes like BCA. To resolve these problems, the college has recruited qualified but non-eligible (i.e. candidates without SET, NET and Ph.D. qualification) candidates on temporary basis as per the University and the State Government norms. The college has invited resource persons, retired experienced teachers to teach the specific topics.

Cross-cutting issues

- The institute organizes workshop empowerment of girls and women faculty.
- The college encourages participation of members of faculty in various programmes like seminars on recent trends in their subjects, research and environmental related programmes.
- The college organizes lectures of academicians, scientists, resource persons of respective subjects.
- The institute organizes empowerment of girls' workshop, which involves training of women faculty members.

Research grants facility

The college always encourages members of faculty to prepare and submit minor or major research projects to different funding agencies such as B.C.U.D., Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune and the UGC. The college provides financial aid for the research to the Principal investigator, in case the funding by respective agency is delayed, also the college waits until the investigator himself/herself receives funding from the agency in order to reclaim its investment.

Study leave

- The college grants study leave and duty leaves to members of faculty for various workshops / conferences / seminars.
- The faculty members get duty leave to attend orientation, refresher courses, central assessment programme and workshops / seminars / conferences.
- The college administration provides registration fees and travelling allowance for faculty member to present papers or for participation in various workshops /conferences / seminars.
- The college grants duty leaves to resource person and eminent scholars.

Support for Research

The college Research Committee encourages the members of faculty for organization of the University, State, National, International workshops /seminars





/conference under quality improvement programme. The Research Committee of the college assists the faculty members in preparing research project, in writing research papers, and in providing information of various conferences/workshops/seminars organized by various colleges and universities. Most of the members of faculty actively carried out their research work and completed their minor / major research projects by utilizing funding received from Board of College and University Development, Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune and the University Grants Commission.

The college provides healthy atmosphere, library and research facilities to encourage faculty members, to enhance their potential and to excel their specialised area.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

Yes, The points considered during feedback by students for evaluation purpose are listed below

- Students provide feedback about different aspects about teachers and their teaching qualities like punctuality, knowledge, teaching skills, sincerity, commitment, motivate and academic guidance, interaction skills, problem solving capability and attitude of teacher and concern of the teacher about students in and out of the classroom.
- Course feedback is also considered which mainly depends upon choices of courses, effectiveness, and future scope in the field.
- Students are also required to give library feedback based upon co-operation of library faculty, number of books academic as well as extracurricular, easy of access.
- Sports faculty members evaluated depending upon the aspects such as availability of equipment, exposure to a player, participation in various competitions.
- Office aspects like co-operation, friendly and helping attitude, healthy operation.
- Laboratories are evaluated by students for points like availability and quality of equipments and arrangement for easy of access.
- Hostel evaluation includes availability of rooms, maintenance, Hygiene and sanitation.
- Apart from student's feedback, parent's feedback is also taken to evaluate the college as a whole.
- The employers invited by the placement cell for the campus interview, also fill up the feedback forms.



2.5. Evaluation process and reforms.

2.5.1 How does the institute ensure that the stakeholders of the institute especially the students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

The college implements a number of measures create awareness about the evaluation process among the students and faculty. Some of which are listed below

- The college prospectus provides information about examination and evaluation methods and procedure to the students as well as their parents.
- Examination committee displays notices regarding examination forms, submission dates and examination schedule.
- The members of faculty inform the students about the internal and University marking systems at the beginning of the year.
- The academic calendar of the college provides tentative dates of the term end and oral for internal assessment examinations.
- The examination department displays notices on student notice board regarding internal and the University examinations.
- All members of faculty inform the students in advance about an upcoming tutorial through notices. Also the members of faculty provide specific syllabus for the same.
- Based on syllabus, members of faculty provide question bank to the students.
- Members of faculty provide a plan of semester-wise home assignments and tutorials to students.
- The college provides lecture note planning notebooks, in which members of faculty mention tutorials, home assignments records.
- Members of faculty also provide timetable of seminars to be conducted by students based on taught topics.
- The college creates awareness among PG students regarding pattern of Choice based credit system examination as per the University guidelines.



Annasaheb Awate Arts, Commerce and H.B.G.Science College, Manchar 2.5.2. What are the major evaluation reforms of the University that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution of its own?

Major evaluation reforms of the University are listed as follows:

- The department of examination, Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune has introduced completely computerized online service for examination.
- Students fill the online examination forms within the given time period.
- Student list, summary reports and hall tickets are generated by online services provided by the University.
- There is transparency and accuracy in the revaluation procedure, examination fees and revaluation fees.
- Since 2009, the examination department of the Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune has provided photo copies of answer sheets to students on their demand.
- Since 2012-13, the University has provided online question papers to the colleges. These question papers are then downloaded, printed and then distributed to the students at the time of the examination.
- The University provides guidelines to the college regarding internal and annual examination, norms for invigilators and senior supervisors.
- The college appoints examination in-charge (CEO) from the senior members of faculty for three years. The examination in-charge is available all the time during examination period.
- The University appoints the college examination officer for co-ordination of the university examination and give remuneration.
 Reforms adopted by the college:

- The college has established examination committee for smooth examination process.
- The class teachers thoroughly check the examination application forms to avoid any mistakes in writing code number of different courses.
- The class teachers also give information to students regarding dates of examination application forms, submission dates and fees of examination.



- During examination period, the college seeks the help of police to avoid misconduct.
- The college also appoints internal squad of male and female teachers for thorough checking of the students appearing for the examination.
- The college provides training to PG members of faculty and students' for Choice based credit system evaluation.
- The subject teacher prepares question paper for college examinations.
- The college is well reputed for stringent policy against copy cases and malpractices. The college follows copy case prevention system under which malpractices during examination are prevented and also strict action is taken on the students caught for the same as per the University norms.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the University and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The institution has been effectively implementing all evaluation reforms made mandatory by the University norms or made by the institution itself. The college strategies regarding implementation of these evaluation reforms are as follows

- The Principal of the college, guide to teaching and non-teaching staff about examination rules and regulation by him.
- Non-teaching staff of examination committee receives training for operating computer, reprography machine, printing, online process of examination and report filling etc.
- The class teachers check the examination application forms of students and then submit these to the examination department which are signed by these teachers as a confirmation that they have been checked.
- During the online form filling and submission period, the college provides computers along with internet and printer facility to the students.
- The college provides rechecking and revaluation facilities for the internal examination to the students in expenses of fees as per the university rules.
- For the proper and accurate paper assessment of examinations, the college provides a central facility like separate hall, time flexibility according to teachers suitability.



• The college implements a compulsory moderation of papers assessed by newly appointed members of faculty.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adapted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

Formative Evaluation:

The formative evaluation approach adopted by the college to measure student achievement by the college are listed below-

- Regular (week or practical wise) assessment of students through group discussions, class tests, home assignments and oral tests are carried out.
- Assessment of seminars and power point presentations given by the students.
- Punctuality and overall attendance of the students is regularly and strictly noted by subject teachers as well as class teachers. The roll call and attendance committee analyze the data of attendance. The committee sends letters regarding absence of students during lectures or practical to their parents.
- This mechanism minimizes absence of students academically and led to a significant rise in attendance.

Summative Evaluation

- All the members of faculty prepare a record of progress of students based on tutorials, home assignments, participation in seminar, internal assessment examination, projects evaluation.
- For post graduate students the University has introduced choice based credit system.
- Members of faculty assess the second year students for compulsory environmental awareness course and give grades based upon students overall performance in written examination and their participation in field work and projects.
- Project for students: Members of faculty give projects on various topics related to subject and guide the students for the same. This activity improves research and evaluative ability of students.
- Through routine evaluation process the formative evaluation is done. It helps to judge students' academic progress, behavior and aptitude.





- Through the summative evaluation, members of faculty identify the strengths and weaknesses of students and also their overall progress.
- 2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.)

The institution has implemented following measures to instill rigor in internal examination:

- Members of faculty follow various aspects of evaluation, like tutorial, home assignments, seminars, competitions, attendance record.
- Post graduate students are evaluated through the given research project work and now the University has implemented Choice based credit system for evaluation of PG students.
- Arts and commerce faculty take annual oral tests for commerce practical and English, Marathi languages as per the University guidelines.
- Science and B.C.A. members of faculty take oral test during practical examination to judge the depth of subject knowledge and understanding.
- Projects for Arts, Commerce and Environmental Awareness programmes are compulsory as per University guidelines.

To assure transparency in the internal examination following policies are adopted by the college

- Members of faculty communicate examination schedule well in advance to the students.
- Tentative dates are mentioned in the academic calendar.
- Members of faculty inform the students about the marking system, semester and annual pattern of examination.
- Examination committee displays examination timetable on the notice board.
- For PG courses choice based credit system is now implemented as per the university guidelines.
- Examination committee personally guides the students to solve their problems related to examination. The committee is always ready to help the students.



• As per the University rules, internal assessment tests and term end examination answer papers are shown to students on their demand.

2.5.6 What are the graduates attributes specified by the college/ affiliating the University? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

The attributes of the graduates specified by our institute are self supportiveness, confidence, positive attitude, hard work, subject knowledge, leadership, communication ability, practical knowledge, research inclination, team work, social awareness, moral values, ethics, imbibing the code of conduct, analytical skills, decision making abilities, discipline, punctuality, patriotism, national integrity, sense of inclusiveness, sense of national pride to become good citizen and sense of independence in our students which is ensured by personality development, soft skills programme, expert lectures, career oriented programmes.

To inculcate the graduate attributes among the students, the college ensures the following attainments.

Academic and co-curricular activities

- Execution of regular teaching activities.
- Transparency in assessment and evaluation.
- Organization of seminars/ workshops/conferences.
- Implementation of career oriented courses for skill development.
- Coaching of competitive examinations for preparation of MPSC and UPSC examination.
- ICT training and free access to ICT resources.
- Organization of field, industrial, agricultural based institutions visits and excursions.

Extra-curricular activities

- Organization of debating, elocutions, essay competitions.
- To develop creativity among students by giving them opportunities to publish college wall papers and the college Annual 'Shivaneri'.
- Sports week and annual gathering to exhibit their skills.
- Organization of *Bahishal* programme to encourage the breadth of vision and critical thinking in students.

Social activities



- NSS activities to explore social awareness in students like blood donation camps, tree plantation, literacy programmes for villagers, female feticides awareness.
- Students are motivated to participate in NCC for inculcating national integrity.
- Raising of funds for Malin Disaster. Staff and student amount Rs. 201000/-

Scientific temperament activities

- Anti-superstitious activities to inculcate scientific temperament in students.
- Science association programmes.
- Science vision wall paper display.
- Anemia, Health and diet awareness rallies camps for students and community.
- Research aptitude and innovation inculcated through project works.

2.5.7. What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and the University level?

Redressal of grievances at the college level:

- The examination committee of the college redresses the grievances of students regarding evaluation.
- The college examination committee sorted out all the complaints and grievances regarding evaluation, pattern of evaluation, mark distribution.
- The college examination in-charge personally solves the queries of students and guides them for the same.
- The college examination committee also helps the students to register their grievances to the University.

Redressal Grievances at the University level

- The university has redressal of grievances cell related to evaluation answer books.
- Students has right to demand photocopy of his answer book for which he/she can fill up an application form within ten days from declaration of the University result. The college submits forms to the University examination department. The University rechecks the answer books for correction in total marks and photocopy is sent to the college. The student can get it from the college.
- The student also submits an application for revaluation along with the demand for photocopy or submits only revaluation form. The University examination





department resolves such complain within fourty five days. If any mistake is found, the student has to submit original mark sheet to the University and then he/she gets revised mark sheet.

2.6 Student performance and learning outcomes

Yes, the college has clearly stated learning objectives. The outcome is brought into notice of each faculty, these are:

- To achieve learning outcomes IQAC and members of faculty plans learning objectives of the year.
- IQAC and departmental meetings are conducted regularly twice in the year. During these meetings semester and annual examinations planning and implementation are discussed.
- The institution encourages students to develop positive attitude and motivates for independent thinking and develop scientific attitude.
- The committees are formed to develop students' personality through various curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.
- The examination results and achievements of students are put on notice board to stimulate and inspire others. Students and staff are made aware of these learning outcomes by displaying on notice board and through the college prospectus.
- The college has formed fifty four committees with a view for holistic development, and temperament so that they are bears a good character and to become good citizens.

The faculty maintains record of regular assessment of academic performance of students. This academic performance of the students is communicated to the students individually in the class room and on notice board.


The classroom attendance of the students is also recorded by their respective class teachers. The parents are informed about the performance and attendance of their wards.

Internal assessment examination, tutorial, home assignment marks and term end examination results are displayed on the notice board.


Members of faculty appreciate the students with good results in examination and also encourage them to further improve their scores. The class teachers' pay special attention to slow learners and give personal guidance to them.




Programme wise results 2011-2012 t0 2015-2016























The above table indicates that the students for Arts faculty have been excellent barring a marginal decline in 2013-14. In the last two years B.Com. result has shown an decreasing trend. UG programme in science has also shown a rise over the years. Due to close monitoring our results have been found to be on the higher side and the college is making efforts to improve it further.

2.6.3 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

IQAC plans and monitors all the curricular and co-curricular activities and collects feedback from all departments and committees. After analyzing it, IQAC reports to the Principal and college local management committee.

Achievements of the intended learning outcomes are made through-

Academic calendar: Before the commencement of the academic year, the college plans the academic calendar.

Teaching plan: Every year semester wise teaching plan is submitted to the head of the faculty.



Evaluation activities: The class test assignment, tutorials; seminars are given to keep the students engaged in the study throughout the year, to find out the slow and advanced learners.

Guest lecturers: Lectures organized to enhance or illuminate students' knowledge and to make them aware of the current research going on in respective fields.

Teaching aids: Modern teaching methods or ICT resources like power point presentation, bio-visual charts, and model, photographs, maps, survey analysis are used to make teaching more effective.

Infrastructure: Science, Commerce and English department has well-equipped laboratories, hence, students' can develop practical skills among them.

Library: The college library is well equipped with text books, journals, reference books and periodicals.

Research center: Botany students explore their knowledge using facilities of the research center.

Project work: Various project works are assigned to the students to develop their creative skills; hence, teacher gets opportunity to assess knowledge, commitment and sincerity of the students.

Study tour excursion/field visits: Study tour excursion and visit to institutes are organized to provide live experience to the students.

Assessment: Assessment of students for internal marks is based on their overall performance which includes class test, assignments, seminar, project work and attendance.

To make students attentive and to complete their curriculum special attention is given on the attendance report. Monthly attendance report is prepared. The students having low attendance, their parents are informed.



Along with academics to bring about social responsibility and awareness toward the society among the students is achieved with the help of NSS committee.

2.6.4 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placement, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students) of the course offered?

The college takes up the following measures and initiative to enhance social and economic relevance of the course

Economic relevance

Students' placement cell: This cell conducts campus interviews of various companies for employment of the students.

Research aptitude-

Innovation-Projects are given to the students to enhance their innovation. The students are motivated to take part in Poster presentation and Quiz competition organized by the other Colleges.

Visits to various industries are also organized for students to give them practical knowledge of respective subjects.

Guest lecturers: Lectures of the renowned persons are arranged to motivate students.

NSS and NCC: NSS and NCC organize programs to enhance the social and economic relevance of the course. To enlighten social and economic relevance towards the society various rallies have been organized. Anti-superstition committee provides knowledge to students against wrong customs of society.

2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

Data on student learning outcomes is collected through

- Student Feedback forms are given to students in which students give feedback on teachers, courses, office, sports, library, hostel and other facilities provided by the college.
- Class tests, assignments, project work, attendance and examination are conducted to check student progress.
- Regular attendance of students in curriculum is collected monthly by subject teachers.
- To classify students into slow and advance learners based on their previous results.
- Interest shown by the students during visits to various industries and study tour excursion and their views are also considered.
- Participation of students in extracurricular activities is noted through the attendance records.

Analysis of data on student learning outcome

- The IQAC analyses and evaluates the performance of teachers, and the college facilities based upon student feedback forms.
- Respective teachers evaluate students on their academic performance and classify them into slow and advance learners.
- Percentage of monthly attendance of individual student is given to respective class teachers.
- The subject teachers analyses the views regarding visits of various institutes.
- The committee chairperson analyses the attendance data of extracurricular activities and attentiveness of the students.



Planning to overcome learning barriers

- The subject teachers send the views of students regarding course content and its scope to the respective board of studies members and chairpersons.
- Local Management Committee of the college discuss about student feedback on library, office, sports, and hostel facilities and try to resolve the related issues.
- To minimize drop out of the slow learners, the class teachers give special attention to these students through Parent Teacher Scheme and conducts remedial courses.
- The class teacher sends letters to the parents regarding absentees' record of their wards. It helps them to complete their curriculum.

- Members of faculty become informal mentors of slow and advanced learners. The slow learners get special coaching like remedial coaching, bridge courses and for advanced learners, the college organizes workshops/seminars/ conferences and
- provides opportunity to advanced learners to compete with students of other colleges.
- Members of faculty regularly inform students regarding their performance and counsel them.
- Members of faculty conduct oral tests and viva voce at regular practical course to judge communication skills and knowledge of the students.

Sensitive equipment the voltage stabilizer available for emergency voltage equalizer. In addition to the common measures such as Installing inverters/UPS spike guards to take care of voltage fluctuations and voltage spikes. There one three phase central generator of capacities of 20 KVA. These are used during major power failures or during 'load shading 'period. Thus the sensitive equipment are provided with additional protection against voltage fluctuations with the help of such UPS/ inverters and by installing voltage stabilizer dedicated to such equipment as bellows:





IR,UV-visible light instrument, AC room, shaker incubator, CO2 instrument in botany department [tissue culture research lab], hot air oven , deep freezer and other instrument of biological sciences provided stabilizer power



Medical assistance to students: health centre, health insurance etc.

Medical Insurance Coverage is provided to all students of the college. As a part of health care the girl students are facilitated with services like HB count checking and raising programme. In addition to the Health centre, usual first aid is available at different points on the Campus. Facility of transportation to hospitals at the time of emergency is also available at the hostels and the sports complex. We also provide a Psychologist for weekly check-up of girl students.

Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams.

The language lab through its various activities imparts skills in communication, presentation, editing and self-study. In addition, the Department of English also designs and executes need based skill development courses of different kinds and durations for the students of UG as well as PG. Facility of computer related courses are also available on the college campus.

In the Science faculty, repeat practical are arranged and demonstration on same practical also arranged. These repeat practical provide avenues for slow learners to improve upon while the advanced learners understand the underlying principles deeply. In some science departments interactions of slow learners with fast learner are arranged by student seminar and PPT presentation learners interact with. Theoretical principles and procedures of the experiments are explained to the students before the conduct of the practical, preferably using multimedia presentations.

PG students of Chemistry and UG students of Physics, Electronics, Biotech, Computer Science, Zoology, Chemistry, Botany, NCC and NSS visit following institutes to participate in activities like research, science experiments, seminars, workshops, camps and competitions Savitribai Phule Pune University, GMRT (Khodad), Alibaug and Mahabaleshwar for Collection of Species of Botany & various Industries in Rasayani. Students of commerce faculty visit industries like Gowardhan Milk Dairy, Various Banks, Patsansthas etc .Department of Geography, Economics & Commerce arrange the Industrial Visits.

Introduction of new courses

In keeping with mission statement and the stated goals, the institute makes sincere efforts to provide modern education to youth of Pune region. It introduces new courses considering the need and employment opportunities. In last five years one under graduate course (B.Sc. in Biotechnology) and a post graduation courses (M.Sc.in Organic Chemistry,) have been started. Considering the need for research center in the area, the



institution has started the Ph.D. research center in Botany. Such an introduction of new courses has definitely facilitated student progression to higher education.

Career guidance

Students are motivated for higher education and made aware about job opportunities available in the industries through material on career and employment opportunities courses by other institutes, etc. displayed in notice boards by various departments. Workshops and motivational lectures of experts are regularly organized to guide students about career options available.

Competitive Examination Guidance

The institute runs competitive examination centre wherein the interested students are guided for competitive examination like MPSC, UPSC, IBPS, and SSC.

Student Placement Cell

The institute has a separate student placement cell that organizes campus interviews. Apart from this students are guided personally by the respective faculty, as every department and the faculty have personal support with students.

Various Activities

Special efforts like organization of industrial visits, personality development seminars etc. are arranged to inculcate skills and qualities required by the job market.

5.2.4 Enumerate the special support provided to students who are at risk of failure and drop out?

Special support to students who are at risk of failure and drop out is provided through counseling, remedial coaching and financial aid.

The students who are at the risk of failure are identified and the reasons for their possible drop out are first identified through personal interaction. Counseling is done to



help student come out of the dismal situation forcing him/ her to drop out. Psychological as well as financial support is provided by the professional counselor, if necessary. Counseling is usually done for girls with "early marriage" problems. Communication with the students as well as parents generally sorts out the failure problems.

Remedial coaching is arranged for students who are at the risk of failure. Measures like extra coaching, open-book exams and additional tests are taken for such students.

Many a time the possible drop out of students may be due to financial reason. In such cases financial support is provided to students by various means including personal finance or permission by the principal to pay the fees in installments as and when possible.

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

His motto: **"Education through self help"** has been the significant and chief drive of social change through which Dr. Bhaurao Patil visualized to achieve the different tasks of nation building by establishing social equality and social justice.

The aims and objectives of the college include academic excellence, social concern and character formation.

The mission statements:

In order to achieve the vision as visualized by the founder of our mother institution, we are committed to impart higher education through the University formal courses and non-traditional self-financing and short-term courses for the upliftment of the backward, the depressed, the underprivileged and the tribal communities of the region with a view to inculcate values and virtues among the students as stated in the aims and objectives of the institution. Some of the major missions of the institution are as follows:

1. To impart value based, job oriented and real life education

2. To build and enhance educational skills necessary in today's society

3. To empower the students through modern learning techniques and participation in curricular,

co-curricular, extracurricular activities and extension



4. To develop and enhance the students real life problem solving skills

5. To encourage and reinforce the critical thinking skills of the students

6. To develop research culture among the staff and students and to carry out community oriented eco-friendly research for development of the region

7. To generate equal opportunities for tribal community students of this region

8. To develop the students' ability to communicate intelligently

Rayat Shikshan Sanstha's Annasaheb Awate Arts, Commerce and Hutatma Babu Genu Science College has created its unique place in the Northern region of Pune district. This institution with its roots in early post-independence period has always stood for the cause of nation building through empowerment of the weak and its mission of character building. The underprivileged people of this region and especially the tribal communities have been given an open access to learning at an affordable cost by this college.

Being an affiliated college majority of the programmes are conventional ones. But in the last decade the element of employability has been added to that of affordability by starting a number of new and job-oriented programmes in emerging fields of study.

In addition to the new courses, an array of opportunities is provided to the students for realizing, maximizing and actualizing their potentials. The regular and innovative co-curricular and extracurricular activities of the college act as an effective means of value inculcation, character formation and social reformation. The college also aims at instilling scientific zeal and research culture necessary for this region. Through its threefold system i.e. academic, co-curricular and extra–curricular programmes, the college tries to kindle the students' sense of ethics and leadership potential and sensitize them towards inclusive social concerns, human rights, gender and environmental issues thereby. The vision and mission of the institution reflect the objectives of the national policies of higher education, namely molding human resources to meet contemporary challenges.

6.1.2 What is the role of top management, principal and faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

The college is governed by the Rayat Shikshan Sanstha, Satara (Maharashtra). Though there is a physical distance between the college and the Sanstha office, the active management network and various means of technological communication make it



convenient for the management, the principal and faculty, especially the IQAC, to step in together for designing and implementing the quality policy and plans from time to time.

The management regularly seeks feedback from the principal and the stakeholders on the academic programmes and facilities and invites participation of the staff in various capacities for successful planning and implementation of the ongoing as well as the future programmes. The Board of Life Members, the unique body of academicians plays a prominent role in making interface between the college and the management. One staff member of the college, Mr. Chandrakant Thorat is nominated on the Transfer committee and two teachers of the college, Prof. S. D. Shinde and Dr. P. R. Botre are nominated on the Life member board and Managing Council of the sanstha.

As the head of the institution, the principal of the college provides requisite leadership to the system. He ensures that all provisions of the State Government, University Grants Commission, University bye-laws, the Statutes and the regulations are observed. By convening meetings of the Advisory Committee and various other bodies he arrives at and implements the decisions of the said bodies. As academic leader, he evolves strategies for academic growth in association with various faculties.

The faculty is actively involved in decision-making process. The meetings are arranged periodically by all the HODs and the principal of the institute to decide policies and their implementation. The recommendations of the conveners of various committees are submittedthrough the principal, to the Life Members Board and to the Governing Body which in turn arrives at suitable decisions for implementation.

6.1.3 What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring?

The leadership of the college plays an important role in formulation and implementation of action plans for the fulfillment of the stated mission. Some of the major features of this involvement can be stated as follows:

- Formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan

Reinforcing the culture of excellence

The principal and the IQAC, in formal and informal ways, often state and explain the mission and goals of the institute to all its stakeholders and seek their suggestions and support before the formulation of the action plan. The leadership finalizes its action plans for all the operations to be carried out in the stipulated period on the basis of the outcome of the consultations with the members of the LMC and the mother institute on one hand and the student representatives, parents, alumni, industry, and the teaching and nonteaching staff on the other. The leadership constantly strives for excellence in all its activities and operations. The faculty meetings are held periodically. A conscious effort is made by the leadership to emphasize the organizational culture and the need for quality sustenance of the college during every staff meeting. The increasing number of academic courses, essential growth in infrastructure facilities, the rising graph of passing percentage, the achievement in co-curricular and extracurricular activities and the consequent recognition by the university and the UGC substantiate the efforts of the leadership for excellence.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

The stages and procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans for effective implementation and improvement are as follows:

• The broad goals set for the new academic year are communicated to the whole staff in the general staff meeting hold at the beginning of the academic year.

• Various committees and their conveners are appointed on the basis of performance in the previous year and willingness.

• The committees submit their action plans for approval during the formal meetings held on the early days of the new academic year.

• After taking into account all factors related to the proposals from various committees, the principal and management authorities make valuable suggestions for improvement in the plan.





After receiving sanction from the principal and the management authorities the committees are allowed to implement the improved plan with all the due freedom. . • In view of getting the required response from different staff members and departments

from time to time, the approved plans of various activities are communicated to all the heads in the HOD meetings. This helps in mutual coordination and proper balancing of curricular as well as other activities.

• The principal and concerned vice principals also conduct meetings with the respective committees before and after the organization of programmes.

• Publicity is given to the upcoming events in order to seek participation and cooperation of the stakeholders.

• The committees carry out their activities and immediately report to the principal, concerned vice principal and the group coordinator about the outcome of the activity.

• At the end of the term and the academic year the conveners submit the reports of the work done to the IQAC and the head of the institution.

• These activities are evaluated by the IQAC.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The top management of the Rayat Shikshan Sanstha consists of highly educated persons such as Member of Parliament, advocates, cost accountants, tax consultants etc. Experts in their own fields, as they are well aware of the developments taking place all around, they regularly show their concern about the academic matters in the college and extend their full support to the faculty by suggesting newer academic programmes. They actively participate in the deliberations during occasions such as meetings of Local Managing Committee, academic audit and make significant contributions to the decision making process on various issues.

A few recent notable instances of such leadership are as follows:

At the **faculty level** the leadership is groomed in the following 5 stages:

- **Stage I** -Involving each and every member in the college activities of his/ her own choice
- **Stage II-** Appreciating the innovative ideas and leadership qualities shown by a staff member and assigning him/her higher and higher responsibilities by providing freedom, formal and informal training and full moral and administrative support
- **Stage III** Appointing the trained, mature, trustworthy experienced personnel as the convener or head of some activity
- Stage IV- Subjecting the deserving and grooming individual faculty to internal transfers according to the need so that he/ she is exposed to the workings of different departments
- **Stage V** After proving the abilities he/she is made to play still higher and challenging roles such as hostel superintendant, vice principal or faculty representative in the governing body

At the level of students, some committees like Editorial Board of College Annual Magazine, Vidyarthini Manch, NCC and NSS have a formal representation of students where they are motivated to express their views and participate actively in the decision making process. Also the members of the Student Council of the college are provided with a number of opportunities to prove their leadership qualities. Furthermore, a special inter-class and inter-stream Elocution Contest is organized every year in the memories of Late Mr. Annasaheb Awate, the first MLA of Ambegaon Tehsil. The NCC and NSS units of the college also play a vital role in leadership development by sending optimum number of cadets and volunteers to participate in leadership training programmes such as **UDAAN** as well as various national and state level activities like Republic Day Parade, Adventure Camps etc. Leadership is also developed through participation in state and national level sport events. Such policies and efforts of the institution for last many years have given this region a number of leaders of all sorts- academic, administrative, political, social and cultural fields.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?





Though the principal is the central authority in taking policy decisions, the hierarchy in administrative work in the college favors decentralization policy. The Vice-Principal who is second-in-command and the coordinator of the IQAC are entrusted with the responsibility to implement the principal's decisions by coordinating academic, administrative, co-curricular, research, extra-curricular and extension activities.

The academic affairs of the three faculties are looked after by three respective Faculty Incharges, Vice-Principals of the faculties and they enjoy adequate operational autonomy in a number of matters such as designing and running of remedial teaching programmes, designing and implementing internal evaluation pattern and schedules, organizing seminars, workshops and conferences, and deputing or nominating faculty members for various in-house committees. All the academic and other activities including administration are classified and grouped undereight core committees formed corresponding to the criteria of the NAAC. The senior faculties at the top of hierarchy with prowess are the coordinators of these core committees who act like mentors or advisors to the conveners of individual committees under their umbrella. These coordinators also enjoy freedom to decide operational schedule and modalities to make quality improvement in their activities.

The heads of the academic departments and the conveners of the co and extracurricular departments stand next to have operational freedom and autonomy. It is their ideas, their suggestions and their recommendations that count most in the planning and implementation of most of the activities. Similarly, the non-academic administrative work done under the Office Superintendent is distributed among different office bearers like a head-clerk, a senior clerk, and junior clerks. The office activities are monitored by the office superintendent with the help of the principal.

The decentralization process is carried unto the last or the junior most of the staff members by taking care that no member is left out without any responsibility coupled with autonomy however small. The principal is very keen on providing opportunities to each and every employee to exhibit his/ her qualities and skills in the work of his/ her choice.

Yes, the college promotes a culture of participative management. Participatory mechanisms work at every stage to ensure quality-lift. The participation of the staff is ensured in the planning stage of these activities by conducting meetings. The staff members participating in execution of the institutional activities are motivated and appreciated for good work at the time of functions arranged by the management. The faculty from the college involved in the management of the Sanstha is as follows:




6.2.2 Does the institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.

6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the

The Principal ensures that adequate information is communicated to the top management and stake holders. The Principal collects information through various meetings like forum of heads, IQAC, as well as from the minutes of meetings of different statutory/ non statutory committees. This information is placed before the local management committee of the college.

The college uses the data and information obtained from the feedback in decision making and performance improvement. This is obtained through questionnaires given to students and staff members of the college on academic as well as on campus experience. A team of teachers takes review with reference to requirements of every department and gives a feedback to the Principal, who presents this to the LMC for appropriate action. Developments in the college are also communicated to the parents and alumni during their meetings. Suggestion Boxes are placed at prominent locations in the campus. This is a continuous source of suggestions for improvement of infrastructure and services. The concerned sections/departments/persons are informed about their feedback for improvement or for encouragement and appreciation.

6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

The college provides all the departments with the computer and internet facilities for the faculty as well as students to gain the recent knowledge concerned with their subjects. The library of the college is full of various facilities for the staff and the students. It provides a study friendly environment and internet wi-fi facilities for the faculty and the students.

In order to encourage the faculty for their participation in the research and in various research oriented programmes the college allots the duty leaves as well as look



after the financial support for the same. The Staff Welfare Committee of the college also arranges many motivational lectures by eminent personalities. The Department of Physical Education has been actively engaged in conducting physical fitness and health checking practices for the staff.

The staff is entrusted the responsibility for different tasks such as college

admissions, examinations, document verifications, form collection for scholarships, Rail/ bus concessions as well as handling the university/government correspondence. In addition to the involvement of faculty members in the various academic and administrative committees, there is always a representation and support of the non-teaching staff for all these activities.

The best teacher as well as best non teaching staff awards are given every year based on the annual performance. The teaching and non teaching staffs are always felicitated for any special achievement during staff meetings. The college felicitates the successful and deserving staff in college functions giving publicity to their work in press and in-house newsletters.

- Due to the gradual increase in strength of students the existing infrastructure meets the difficulties in its smooth function so our management has taken a decision to construct a new building consists of 5classrooms covering1013.797Sq. Mtrs. of cost Rs. 1,03,05,300 (One Crore three lakhs five thousand three hundred rupees) during the year 2014-15.
- As mentioned above separately urinal block of 62.74 Sq. Mtrs. having cost rupees 10,05,100 has been constructed.
- A Infrared Spectrometer worth rupees 13 lakhs has been purchased for the department of Chemistry
- For security purpose wall compound for ladies hostel is constructed and security workers from a private agency have been appointed.
- For beautification of campus lawn cutter is purchased



- The UV- Spectrometer software was purchased as per requirement of Botany Department
- Installation of CC TVs in library, and at the college campus

Yes, the affiliating university makes a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution but the decision related to this issue is totally depend upon our mother institute.

• As per provisions of Maharashtra University Act 1994,the college has formed a "Anti Ragging Committee" which looks after that no student faces any sort of ragging at and around the college campus

- Student's Council meeting and parent meetings provide platform to address the grievances of the students and parents respectively.
- Students and parents meet the principal, vice-principals to present their feedback.

• Written feedbacks from students about teachers and support services give valuable input.

• The college permits and provides the faculty with the utmost possible facilities to attend the various programmes as resource persons or key-note speakers.

• The college also promotes and provides economic supports for the organization of guest lectures by eminent and expert persons in the college.

• The various faculties of the college have been working in LIC Committee of the university.

• The library procures research journals and e-material as a source for the research

activities. Wi- Fi and Internet facilities are made available for the faculty. Adequate financial provision is made for purchasing research grade equipments.


• Under the UGC Faculty Improvement Programme teachers are send for research work. One of our faculty members, Prof. Dayanand Suryawanshi (Dept. of Chemistry) has been doing his research work of Ph. D. under FIP Scheme.

• The teachers are encouraged to represent various bodies/ committees at university level, 02 HODs have been working actively as a part of BOS. The faculty members are allowed for examination work. Faculty is encouraged to attend the conferences/seminars/ workshops and to present their research work. In last five years the number of faculty members attended conference, seminars and workshops is 241 and 140 research papers have been presented by the faculty at International, National and State level seminars and conferences. The number of the published research papers in various national and International journals are 265. The faculty members have engaged themselves in enhancing the teaching skills using ICT for effective teaching –learning process.

• The mother institute organizes various training programmes for administrative staff where in non teaching staff is divided into various groups as per their job work. The responsibilities in the laboratories, smooth conduct of the practical and work ethics such topics are discussed in it.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?





• Orientation and Motivation workshop for newly appointed faculty

This workshop is aimed to give overview of vision, mission, policies, plans and operating procedures of the institution.

• Workshop on - 'How to Prepare Research Proposal?'

This workshop for teachers of three to ten years service is aimed to explore various funding agencies, formats of project proposals and possibilities of inter-disciplinary research. This workshop is conducted in collaboration with Research Committee to induce research culture in the faculty members.

Workshop on use of Intranet

All academic and administrative sections of the college are connected through Intranet. Workshop was arranged to demonstrate operating procedures of Intranet and transfer of data at various locations.

• Workshop on use of library software

Under Libreria (library software) the computerization of library is in progress. The library staff is familiar with the same software and issuing process is ongoing. Teachers were trained to handle this software for using the library resources more effectively. The INFLIBNET provided in these N-LIST facilities on e-journal and e-book. Numbers of national and international journals are available in library for students and staff. OPAC facilities are also made available.

• Organization of communication skills programme for the faculty

This programme was aimed at enhancing basic communication skills required for day to day communication in English.



• Organization of a training programme concerning with use of software for the non teaching staff

6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

- At the endof academic year, every teacher submits PBAS and API along with supporting documents to IQAC. The IQAC scrutinizes and assign scores under various categories.
- College and IQAC have developed a well defined mechanism to collect, to scrutinize and to store this information properly.

The result of a particular subject is an indicator to evaluate performance of a teacher. Department wise and individual faculty wise analysis of results is undertaken. This data is then submitted to principal through faculty vice principal. The principal discusses the results in the HOD Forum for enhancement. The departments with 100% result are felicitated.

- Conveners of the co-curricular and extra-curricular activities submit immediate feedback to the coordinator/vice principals/principal after completion of respective activities and future strategies are immediately decided.
- The college follows PBAS of UGC as prescribed in its regulation of June 2009. Our university has developed an API system which based on PBAS system by UGC. The college IQAC addresses all the issue to appraisal system of the staff and regularly evaluates it.
- Every teacher maintains his diary (Lecture notes) which gives clear information of all academic contributions. The various committees are working for co-curricular and extra co- curricular activities and feedback of each committee is taken by principal regularly.
- Conveners of co-curricular and extra-curricular activities submit comprehensive report of their activities for the annual magazine 'Shivneri'. This is the document where all the reports are captured and comparative account of last five years' annual magazine makes quality enhancement evident.





• The quality policy is reviewed through Principal's visit to department and academic audit by external agency Rayat Quality Management System (RQMS).

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How they are communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

API reports of the faculty members are reviewed by the HODs, reports of HODs are reviewed by IQAC and these reports are reviewed by the principal. On the basis of API report provided by Government of Maharashtra, time bound promotions of administrative

and non teaching staffs are awarded.

In case of faculty, consecutive performance report is considered with other documents, API for career advancement. Faculty of the college is committed and dedicated one. All the promotions due are granted by the committee constituted by affiliating university with nominee of Director of Education (H.E.), Government of Maharashra. These decisions are communicated orally to the faculty and staff by the principal.

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

- At college level we have staff welfare committee for teaching and non-teaching staff.
- At sanstha level we have the Rayat Sevak Co-operative bank which functions to support each member financially. Our bank is having 12862 share holders and its capital money is 4166.17 lakhs. Total 174 employees are working in the bank for its smooth functioning. The director body of the bank is elected from employees of our sanstha. The bank provides the following loan schemes.
- Loan.1: Rs 12,00,000/- House loan : Rs 40,00,000/-
- Loan.2: Emergency loan Rs 3,00,000/- Vehicle loan : Rs 10,00,000/-
- Festival loan Rs. 1,00,000/-
- Education loan /foreign study: Rs. 10 to 30 lakhs





The best workers from teaching and non-teaching staff are felicitated by the bank since last two years.

- Very important scheme run by our bank for the members is that "Mayat Sabhasad Nidhi" of Rs 10,00,000/-
- Cent percent permanent staff of the college availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years.
- The meritorious wards of our members are felicitated every year by the bank.
- The staff members are encouraged to use the sports facilities available at the campus.
- In need, financial aid is given through the collection of contribution by the staff to the members.
- Honest work of the employees over the academic year in various fields is noted and honored by the management to encourage such work culture in the college. The Rayat Shikshan Sanstha Satara felicitates every year one of the teaching faculties with 'Karmaveer Paritoshik'
- Since last five years the college has been felicitating best teacher and best non-teaching employees with the awards.
- Discounts are given in fees for wards of staff members.
- Quarters are available in campus for the staff.

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

The college administration tries to maintain cordial and healthy relationship with the staff and management. The college strives to provide the requisite facilities to the staff.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The college is managed by Rayat Shikshan Sanstha, Satara. It has well formulated financial policy, which ensures that every year budget is prepared well in advance after taking into consideration the requirements of institute and departments. Every department





is expected to provide list of requirements. The budget is reviewed by team of finance experts from Rayat Shikshan Sanstha who approve the same after necessary changes. The principal and the sanstha are in charge of managing the financial resources effectively. The prior permission of any financial decision is taken by the Sanstha and LMC.

The LMC and the Sanstha study the annual expenditure, scrutinize the budget and provide the feedback for efficient use of financial support. Though above procedure is implemented, the college has its own purchase committee which ensures that the correct equipments with right specification are procured at the best prices.

6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

Our mother institute has its own audit department. The audit system completes statutory audit by Chartered Accountant appointed by the mother institute twice/ thrice in a financial year. The last audit is completed on 4/10/2015. The objections raised by statutory auditor are discussed at the college as well as the Sanstha levels and the attempts are made to find out the solutions.

Auditor General of the government conducts regularly audit of the college and submits the report to the state government.

6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with institutions, if any.

The major sources of institutional receipts are grants in aid received from the state government and the UGC. The institution is also entitled to utilize fees (excluding tuition fees) as per rules for meeting routine expenses.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System (IQAS)

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

a) Has the institution established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)? If 'yes', what is the institutional policy with regard to quality assurance and how has it contributed in institutionalizing the quality assurance processes?

Internal Quality Assurance Cell has been established in the college.

The Institutional policy with regards to quality assurance is

- Realization of predefined objectives
- Better co-ordination
- Improved governance.

At the planning stage itself, the academic and extra-curricular activities are properly grouped and responsibility of their coordination is assigned to senior teachers at the top of the hierarchy. The realization of predefined objectives is done during the meetings of various committees at the beginning of the academic year. In the deliberations of these meetings the strategies of co-ordination are finalized. The academic calendar prepared by IQAC is followed to organize these meetings and schedules of the activities are decided. The meetings of Heads of the Departments forum and meetings of conveners of extra-curricular activities decide the co-ordination. The monitoring on the conduct of the activities is done through the vice principals of the respective faculty and in case of extra-curricular activities through the coordinator of the respective group of activities.

While implementing the programmes, care is taken to introduce some new elements in them and to improve the conduct of activity over that of the previous year. This practice has led to institutionalizing the quality assurance process which is reflected in the results of the academic programmes as well as in the achievements in the various co and extracurricular activities. The addition of new elements coupled with improvement in the conduct of the activities has now became a tradition.



b) How many decisions of the IQAC have been approved by the management / authorities?

All the suggestions regarding the innovations, administration and about research were accepted by the management and authorities of the college.

Hon. Diliprao Walase Patil who is the Chairman of Bhimashankar Sugar Industry, Pargaon Tal. Ambegaon, Dist- Pune has made valuable efforts to make a fund of Rs. 5,00,000/- available as a financial assistance to the college. Apart from this, during the period of his ministry in Higher and Technical Education, Maharashtra State, he helped the college in getting recognition to run Biotech and M.Sc. courses in the college and also in providing the college with the economical support for the infrastructure. The external experts help the college IQAC in terms of understanding the concepts of changes to be made in the administrative structure to align systems and processes. They also provide useful suggestions to organize need based and technical courses for the undergraduate students.

d) How do students and alumni contribute to the effective functioning of the IQAC?

Feedback of students regarding quality implementation of various activities, teachinglearning and infrastructure is sought in formal manner. In addition, feedback is registered through informal manner by heads of the departments, vice-principals and the principal. This feedback is used in framing the quality policy of the institution. Alumni play a vital





role in smooth functioning of IQAC as they provide feedback in informal ways on several occasions such as guest lectures, seminars, workshops, conferences etc. These are utilized to improve the academic and administrative processes. Many alumni support the college economically in organization of seminars, conferences or other events organized by the college providing the possible facilities at their level.

e) How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?

Our IQAC is responsible for monitoring the institutional processes. The IQAC communicates to various committees and also evaluates their performance. On need basis composition of certain committees is altered for achieving the objective of committee. The information regarding to research scheme and orientation of researchers, effective operation process is done by IQAC. All faculty members and Heads participate in academic and administrative decision making process whenever necessary. All teachers are supported practically in academic and administrative process. The IQAC also maintain healthy practices with office staff regarding the accounts and audit providing the data of various aspects of the college.

6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated framework for quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'yes', give details on its operationalization.

Yes, we have academic calendar according which academic activities are done. We have integrated frame of quality assurance and sustenance of academic and administrative activities, internal coordination of various activities are done through the head of department. Certain issues needing wider consolation and deliberation are sorted out in the meeting of head and LMC. The academic and administrative staff of the college is bound to the norms and regulations of the university and UGC. Both step in together for implementing the quality policy and plans from time to time. The college conducts the combined meeting of the academic and administrative staff at the beginning of each academic year to form various committees for the smooth and sustainable functioning of





academic and administrative operation. The meeting of IQAC is regularly arranged for discussion on academic and administrative matter to ensure monitoring of programme and sustenance and enhancement of the quality of higher education as stipulated by NAAC. The principal of the college guides in planning, monitoring and evaluating the mechanism regarding academic and administrative processes.

6.5.3 Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the Quality Assurance procedures? If 'yes', give details enumerating its impact.

Yes, the Training and Retraining Committee of the college undertakes various training programmes.

For effective implementation of the quality assurance procedures the training is given to the staff. Of the many such instances, few are illustrated below:

Training for Newly appointed faculty in the colleges:

A workshop for this group of teachers is arranged in the beginning of the year. This workshop deliberates on teaching skills, use of ICT in the teaching, class control, evaluation techniques, and orientation towards research, student research and participation in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.

Outcome:

Newly appointed teachers feel confident about the procedures prevailing in the college which constructively helps them as well as the department they belong to.

A Training for Research Festival 'Aavishkar'

A workshop of participating students and guiding teachers is conducted. The rules and procedures of preparing poster presentation and oral presentation are discussed in this workshop. The procedures of Savitribai Phule Pune University Research Festival 'Aavishkar' are also explained to them.

Outcome:



The presentation skills of the participating research students are found to be enhanced and a spirit of competition is found to be developed.

6.5.4 Does the institution undertake Academic Audit or other external review of the academic provisions? If 'yes', how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

They accredited college and suggestions are given to us. The visits of the university officers, Joint Director, Education Department of the state government and eminent scientists, Best College Award Committee of S. P. Pune University, LIC Committee etc. provide valuable suggestions. Sincere efforts are made to implement them.

Yes, we have taken the following steps to review teaching learning process

Criterion VII: Innovations and Best Practices

7.1 Environment Consciousness

7.1.1 Does the institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

The environmental Audit is not conducted in the college yet but some of our faculty members who are formally trained in Environmental Science are taking efforts about keeping green environment with regard to Tree Plantation programme, waste disposal, electricity consumption, plastic free campus etc. Taking into consideration the institutional requirements the following remedial measures are taken:

- Installation of common solar lights
- Replacement of conventional lights with CFL or LED as per the needs.
- Rain water harvesting in monsoon season for laboratory requirement.
- Roof tap water harvesting for ground water recharge.
- Phyto remediation for controlling water pollution
- Use of green litter in vermin-culture production.
- Tree Plantation
- Celebration of No Vehicle Day
- Plastic free College Campus Movement
- Organization of rallies for Environmental Protection and Water Conservation
- Compulsory module for Environmental Awareness Programme for Second year student of college.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make Campus Eco-Friendly?

• Energy Conservation-: Habit to switch off lights and fans in the classroom, laboratories, staffroom and common places is induced in students and faculty. For the energy conservation, all CRT monitors are replaced by the LED type.







Replacement of conventional fluorescent lights with CFL and LED was done in auditorium, Principal' cabin, office, laboratories and library etc.

• Use of Renewable Energy- s

Solar street light is installed on college play ground. It is aimed to replace conventional light to solar light LEDs at on potential in Library, Gymkhana, and Hostel etc.

- Water Harvesting -: Roof top rain water harvesting is practiced in Chemistry laboratory. Rain water is collected in a tank and used as distilled water in Chemistry and Biology laboratories. Other roof tap rain water is allowed to penetrate in the ground to recharge the ground water table.
- Check Dam Construction-: We have three (3) check dams on the khardi nala flowing from our premises. Phyto remediation is practiced for cleaning and control water pollution of check dams. College has a Farm –Tank capacity of 1.25 Crore liters. It has huge source for water conservation purpose. The conserve water is efficiently used for growth and development of trees, planted by the faculties and students. Drift irrigation practices are concretely followed in horticulture projects and botanic gardens. Fish Farming is practiced in Check dams which help to keep our campus eco-friendly and also earning benefits.
- Efforts for Carbon Neutrality-: Carbon reduction is achieved by plantation in the campus. Reuse of rough paper for printing is practiced at large. No Vehicle Day is adopted to conserve fuel and optimize our campus eco-friendly.
- **Plantation** -: The various ornamental, fruit, medicinal, avenue trees and forest plants are regularly planted on the occasion of Independence Day, Republic Day, and Vasundhara din by our students, faculty members, stake holders and NGOs in the college campus. The regular maintenance of the planted trees is allotted to our students and faculty members.



• Solid Waste Management-: The biodegradable green litter collected from college campus is utilized to prepare vermin-compost. A vermin-culture project is practiced in medicinal plant botanic garden. The vermin-compost prepared is used for plants like mango, tamarind, coconut, moringa and Amala etc in garden.

Non-biodegradable solid waste like plastic papers, bags, pen, refills and other are collected regularly by the students and faculty members at one place. Non-biodegradable waste is collected in the dust bins (Penguin boxes) installed in college premises, and then it is to be given to plastic recycling agencies.

7.2 Innovations

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

- Use of computer software for the admission and results of UG, PG classes.
- Surveillance through CCTV for better discipline and security.
- Physical Fitness (Yoga) Programme, Stress management programme conducted for all faculties.
- Computer training programme conducted for faculty members.
- The Maharashtra State level special programme like "Jagar Janiwancha" for women empowerment and gender sensitization was arranged.
- Short Term Courses conducted for the development of commercial and social attitude among the students.
- The effective use of ICT practices in classroom and laboratories are practiced for effective and quick realization of the subject contain among the students.
- Automation and digitalization library is in progress.
- Active participation of students in research oriented programmes like Avishkar, Spectrum, Science Day organization and Bio-Tech exhibition for inculcation of scientific attitude among the masses.
- LAN and intercom facilities are provided to each and every department for effective communication among them.
- Training for school teachers from catchment area was arranged in co-operation with our mother institution Rayat Shikshan Sanstha for RTS, MTS and GS.





- Departmental wall papers and college Magazine activities were conducted as means of communication and application of knowledge.
- Organization of Short Term skill oriented courses and Soft Skill Programme were organized for benefit of students.

7.3 Best Practices

Best Practice I

Karmaveer Bhaurao Patil Earn and Learn Scheme

Goal:-The goal of this practice is to introduce values of Human Labour among the adolescent students. We would like to create 'Self Motivation' and Self Confidence' under the spiritual development of our student in coming future. In addition, to cultivate culture of work among them.

The Context:-Padmabhushan Dr. Karmaveer Bhaurao Patilwas the founder of our mother institution Rayat Shikshan Sanstha, Satara. The foundation of our institute is based on Earn While Learn Scheme. Dr. Karmaveer Bhaurao Patil, who had enlightened the said vision and mission by expressing the creative identity of work culture to built-up personality of students,. Keeping the view we also emphasized earn while learn scheme. The students coming from rural background are economically weak so that their economic need should be fulfilled up to certain extent through this scheme.

The practice -: The student who enrolled in the college from UG to PG are eligible to participate the said scheme. The working schedule is prepared according to the need and availability of work to be done at physical and intellectual ability. The untrained students or beginners are allowed for physical work in Garden and horticultural project, while the senior and intellectual computer literates are allowed to work in office library and departments.

The economic funds are raised from student Welfare Department of S.P.P.U. the university authority provides 100% funding for girls students and SC, ST, NT and minority students. 75% funding is provided by the university authority for open category students, the remaining 25% funding for the same is added by college itself.

Outcome-: our college provides earn while learn facility for about 75 to 100 students per year. We have spent nearly about 2 lakhs to 2.25 lakhs rupees approximately. College





spent about 25,000 to 30,000 rupees for the better development on an average, each student get 7000 to 9000 rupees in a year from which needy students can fulfill their examination fees and their basic requirements, so that their parents get relief from economic crisis. The students who are economically backward and unable to proceed in their higher education, to secure their stream of identity

The maximum girl students had participated and gave their efforts for making the scheme better.

Problems Encountered:-

- 1. Majority of students are not willing to participate in this scheme.
- 2. As compared to the girl students the number of boys' students is less; therefore we have certain limitations to implement the scheme.

Best Practice II

Gender related sensitizing Programme:

Goal -: The goal of the practice is empowerment and enlighten of all our women stakeholders through self awareness and realization by providing them all possible space and opportunities. The women should be with spirit, strong will, strong muscle power and intellectual ability. The women does not engage in bookish education but also she should acquire social awareness about surrounding environment so that she can be aware and fight enough with traditional, social and cultural crisis. When the girls and women have adequate education, rights, space and opportunities, their families, communities and ultimately nations prosper.

Objectives-:

- 1) To develop Personality of girl students
- 2) To develop self confidence
- 3) To enrich of life values
- 4) To guide regarding health, laws, ethics and culture
- 5) To organize expert lectures
- 6) To motivation to participate in NCC, NSS, debates and competitions.



The context-: Chhatrapati Shahu Maharaj of Satara, Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Mahatma Jyotirao Phule and Savitribai Phule were idols in creative education in Maharashtra. Padmabhushan Dr. Karmaveer. B. Patil had influence of Savitribai Phules revolutionary work for girl's education. By taking spiritual depth Padmabhushan Dr. Karmaveer. B. Patil and his wife Laxmibai B. Patil were of the opinion that the girls should be come out in the society and take education along with boys students so that they can develop courage and built their carrier very efficiently, keeping the same view point our college is in collaboration with Savitribai Phule Pune University, Maharashtra Govt. and NGO's have started "Vidyrthini Vyaktimtya Vikas" (Gender Related Sensitizing Programme). The girl students freely participate in the programme and acquire the knowledge with respect to personality development. We run following programmes under the same,

- 1) Personality Development Programme for the girls
- 2) Rangoli Competition
- 3) Cookery Competition
- 4) Hemoglobin Check-up Camp
- 5) Awareness about health, security, self-protection, Yoga, Indian Pinal Code law through expert personalities.
- 6) The Maharashtra State level special programme like "Jagar Janiwancha" for women empowerment and gender sensitization was arranged.
- Implementation of special two short term courses like Beauty Parlor and Fashion Designing.
- 8) Encouragement for participation in NSS, NCC, sports etc for girl students.
- 9) Health counseling by external agencies.
- 10) Every year college send 3 girl students at PG level to participate for one month residential camp of competitive examination organize by S.M. Joshi College, Hadapsar. Expenditure was born by college.

The data gathered from regular feedback from our alumni shows the majority of girls who were students and themselves especially in following areas:

- Local Governance in the village panchayat
- Teachers from U.G. to P.G.
- Police Department
- Tax Consultancy



- Banking
- Entrepreneurship

Problems Encountered and Resource Required:

- 1. The major potential of the girls in this region lies in their sport skills due to the low HB count and poor health.
- 2. Permission from parents to participate in co-curricular and extracurricular activities.
- 3. No adequate response of the girl students about the health schemes of Government.

- The college has volunteered for the Academic and Administrative Audit





Section - I Introduction:

The Annasaheb Awate Arts, Commerce, Hutatma Babu Genu Science College and Sou. Kusumben Kantilal Shah Arts Commerce, Science Junior College at Manchar, Pune District approached the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) for assessment and accreditation of its courses. NAAC in turn appointed the following committee to visit the college between 21 and 22 January 2004.

A.A. Arts, Commerce & H.B.G. Science College run by Rayat Shikshan Sanstha, Satara are affiliated to University of Pune, Maharashtra, and are located about 65 KM north of Pune in a rural and tribal area with a mission to uplift the tribal students through higher education.

Three faculties viz. faculty of Science, faculty of Arts and faculty of Commerce consisting of 17 departments of studies, cater to the needs of 1306 students (U.G. Programme) and 113 students (P.G. Programme). The students are admitted based on their previous academic record through an interview process. Having been located in a rural set up, the college provides remedial/bridge courses to the educationally disadvantaged students.

Out of the total number of 1419 (UG and PG) students 37% are girls. It is gratifying to note that 30 out of 445 girls are pursuing their studies even after marriage. F urther, a significant 10.7% (152) of the total number of students belong to the tribal community.

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There are 40 permanent faculty, 6 with Ph.D., 13 with M.Phil. and 21 with P.G. qualifications, to impart education to the students. 32 non teaching staff assist the administration in the smooth conduct of the institution. The institution functions with an annual budget of about 175 lakhs. The unit cost of education works out to a moderate Rs.7,200/- p.a./student.

The college has a central library, a computer center, sports facilities and a canteen. Health Centre conducts health awareness programmes only, while the hostels are yet to come up. Printing press and workshop facilities are available with the Shikshan Sanstha and are being utilized by the college. Being located in a rural area the college has no national or international linkages. Research and consultancy activities also are yet to take roots.

The perception of the Peer Team members after undertaking the visit to the college, is presented in the following paragraphs:-

Section - II Criterion-wise report:

Criterion I: Curricular aspects:

The institution offers three UG Degree courses (Humanities: BA; Social Science: B. Com., and Science: B.Sc.), and two PG courses (M.A and M. Com.). As at present, there is no provision for students to have an option of time frame and/or horizontal mobility for the courses offered. The temporal pattern of education is annual scheme. Apart from this, one certificate course MSCIT is being offered under the self-financing scheme. This three month certificate course is regulated by the "Knowledge Corporation", set up by the Maharshtra Government, to offer basic skill-oriented training in M.S.Office, Internet and E-mail to its students.

As the college is committed to the cause of empowerment and upliftment of the rural and tribal students through higher education, the institution has set definite goals to promote values of freedom, secularism, equality and social justice as enshrined in the constitution of India. Apart from this, the college has been striving to promote national integration and preserve cultural heritage of our country. Towards achieving these goals, the college believes in developing the integrated personality of its

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wards both through formal and informal modes of education and exposure to various cultural and social aspects of life, through extension activities and outreach programmes.

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A committee has been formed for obtaining feedback on academic matters from faculty and students. Although the University develops the syllabi, the institution has been gathering feedback, to refer to the University through the Principal, to reflect the opinion/s of the faculty, students and even NGOs and employers. As and when required the faculty members serving on the respective subject-Boards of Studies voice their concerns and opinions in the development of curricula by the University. So far modular curricula have not been developed, although, the faculty members have given their suggestions on these lines to the Some modules for particular subjects such as Space respective BOS. Sciences have been suggested by the Faculty members to the University authorities. As the college is affiliated to the university of Pune, as per the MU Act of 1994, it takes about one year for the college to institute a new programme. The college has recently established linkages with potential employers, mostly Co-operative societies and banks. It has developed an MOU with the Dynalog company (Mumbai) for mutual facilities and seek financial and other support.

Criterion II: Teaching-learning and Evaluation:

An admission committee is set up by the college to record, scrutinize and admit its students annually. Weightage is given to previous academic record with interviews and student counseling. There is no special entrance test for admission. On admission the students are subjected to an Interest inventory and aptitude test so that the knowledge and skills of the students is assessed and the students are categorized on the basis of performance. Remedial courses are offered to students coming from academically-weaker sections and educationally disadvantaged backgrounds. Remedial courses are also offered in English, Accountancy and Sciences. Computer literacy programmes are also offered to the students. Many students are first or at best second generation learners. Ever since the inception of the college, the needy students have been motivated to pursue their higher education through "Earn while you learn Scheme". As on date 13 students are under that scheme. They earn nearly Rs.3,000/- p.a. out of which they spend Rs.750/towards their educational cost.

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To aid the advanced learners, the institution recognizes the scholars batch - and imparts special attention to this batch through special coaching for competitive exams. These students are also helped in self study, tutorials, seminars, presentations, projects and assignments as and when organized by the institution. They are also given training in A-V aids, and multimedia devices., and other academic, curricular and cocurricular activities.

In the departmental meetings, the teachers are encouraged to form teaching plans in advance and these are monitored by the HOD and later by the Principal. The teachers use alternate modes of teaching other than the lecture method, using multimedia and other kits.

The college works for 180 days in a year and follows the UGC recommendations for its teaching programmes. Evaluation methods are communicated to its wards through the annual prospectus via an annual calendar of events.

Teachers are recruited through formal advertisements and as per the University rules and government regulations. The college does not have the freedom to appoint ad hoc persons when necessary. Six teachers have attended national level seminars and three, international level seminars in the last two years.

The college has a self-appraisal method of teacher evaluation for teaching, research and extension. The college conducts in house programmes of the Staff Academy for faculty improvement. Up to 2002 six teachers have been benefited by the refresher courses conducted by the UGC and one teacher (Mr.M.B.Wagh) has secured the "Best Teacher award" awarded by the Ambegaon Tehsil Panchayat Samiti.

There are no particular teaching/research linkages established so far. Two teachers have experience in handling minor research projects. Some of the departments have been active in c onducting seminars and conferences. In the last four years six seminars/conferences have been held.

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Criterion III: Research, Consultancy and Extension:

About 10% of the teachers are engaged in active research. Teachers are encouraged to involve in research by offering them study leave and permitting them to submit research projects. The college however does not provide any financial assistance to the teachers for research. About Rs.85,000/- have been generated by two staff members through two research projects which have been completed by 2003. There is no formal publicity for the expertise available in the college. The college has arranged a joint in house seminar on "Information Technology" for the benefit of the faculty members and their counterparts in another college. The college also gives Internet facility to external students and interested members of the public.

The location of the GMRT (Giant Meter wave Radio Telescope) by the Central Government organization-NCRA (National Centre for Radio Astrophysics), in the vicinity of the college, prohibits the establishment of industries in a radius of 30 Km. Therefore, the opportunities for the college to establish linkages with industries is minimal. However, development of "Consultancy Culture" may be directed towards needbased agriculture related enterprises.

One of the teachers is given additional charge of the extension activities of the college. Several community development activities (Adult education, population education, literacy mission etc) are undertaken through the N.S.S. and N.C.C. Much extension work is routed through the N.S.S. activities which are largely directed towards rural and community development issues. The N.C.C. wing of the college has two platoons with 107 students. Many students have won laurels in N.C.C. camps and meetings.

The college has established some linkages with two organizations (NGOs) named 'Shashwat' and 'Ekjut Sanghatana'. A number of students take an active part in Socially-relevant community development programmes through extension activities, such as social forestry, adult education programme and women related issues. Many students are encouraged to visit remote villages to interact with tribal households to learn about the socioeconomic conditions of the latter.

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Criterion IV - Infrastructure and Learning resources-

Out of the 105 acres of land available, 55 acres of land is used for developing infrastructure facilities of the college while the rest is used for social forestry. Administrative wing, Library, 19 class rooms, science laboratories, ladies common room, hostels, residential blocks, gymkhana and students health center are housed in 66596 Sq.Ft. built up area.

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The total number of books available in the library is 42,627. Every year about Rs.50,000 worth books are added. Copying machines and audio video cassettes are housed in the library for use by students. However the library functions only for 8 hours per day and library is yet to be interconnected to other leading libraries. Modernization of library needs to be attended to.

While there are 5 computers in Physics Department, 2 in Electronic Science department, and 19 units in a Centre for Information Technology Literacy (CITL), there is no independent computer center for use by all students and staff. All the above departmental units are available only during the working hours of the college. The computers are maintained with the help of a local contractor and no AMC has been signed with the suppliers.

Limited amount of sports facility is available using which two students have won medals in Inter University and State level competitions.

The hostel facility is noted to be minimal. Out of 15 rooms available (out of 5253 Sq.ft. of built up area) only 5 rooms are used to house 13 students and the remaining students are not in need of hostel facility. 11 employees are accommodated in the available quarters.

Criterion V Student support and Progression:-

Majority of male students complete the course within the minimum period stipulated. However some girl students, being from rural area, drop out due to poor economic condition or certain social obligations such as marriage. A few students take to CISF and BSF, most of them are not

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interested in taking part in competitive examinations such as UGC-CSIR (NET), Gate, and Indian Civil Services.

The sanstha has conducted a Talent Search Examination for the VII & VIII standard students studying in the schools run by it and two of the students so selected are provided scholarships for their higher studies and provided admission in the college.

The Karmaveer Pattern, Teacher-parent Association, Personal Guidance to students, preparation for Medical Entrance Examination, special guidance classes during vacation for science students, all these help the students to achieve better results in the University Examinations.

The college is an identified nodal center for the e-governance module, envisaged by the Rayat Shikshan Sanstha as a pioneering project to network it's schools as also for outreach computer awareness to the rural masses.

Along with the curricular (co-curricular) Extra curricular cultural activities are undertaken by the college to enhance all round development of personalities of students.

A large number of students (418) receive scholarships provided by State and Central government. A feedback mechanism to assess the teaching method is available. An employment cell exists in the college and this is manned by an employment officer. 5 students have been so far employed in Government sector and 15 have taken up self employment.

The college prospectus published regularly provides information in respect of admission procedure, fees structure and the calendar of working for the academic year. Only local students join this college.

An alumni association has been formed and it is yet to function effectively. Most of the Alumni are in good positions in Politics and industry and they feel highly indebted to the college (a fact noted from Alumni meet).

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Criterion VI Organisation and Management-

A local managing council oversees the functions of the college. The college is mainly manned by the Principal and the Heads of Departments. Faculty and staff are appointed by selection committees formed for the purpose. Non teaching staff are given training in computer programming to enhance their professional skills. About Rs.1125/- is being levied as tuition fee and other related fees from each student annually. While 75% of income is spent on academic services only about 8% are spent on student welfare measures. The financial details of the college are scrutinized by an internal audit.

Resource mobilization techniques are yet to find their root in the rural organization. A grievance redressal cell has been formed to look into the grievances of all the employees and students. In an attempt to incorporate strategic planning in it's management practices, the institution has recently developed a quality management module. This mechanism when fully adopted would be a value-addition to the college.

Since the full time Principal retired in December 2003, an acting Principal is looking after the administration of the college and a full time Principal is yet to be posted. The management runs a number of colleges (about 40) all over the state (2 in Bombay and the rest in rural areas), the primary aim being to help the down trodden in the remote areas in their higher education. This, according to the management, necessitates transfer of faculty within the 40 institutions at regular intervals since everybody is expected to serve in remote places at some time of his service.

The management has been able to implement a number of welfare measures such as free education to the children of employees up to their P.G. courses, arrangement of I oan by a Co-operative Bank for housing and other specific purposes, providing jobs for widows of employees on compassionate grounds, a lump sum payment to employee's family when he dies in harness, and LTC to home town once every two years.

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Criterion VII - Healthy Practices:-

The Peer Team observes that the following are the notable healthy practices adopted by the college.

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- Encouragement to tribal/rural girls in their higher education.
- Earn while you learn scheme.
- Student admission without any minimum entry marks.
- Effective use of infrastructure facilities.
- Welfare measures to employees.

10.7% of the students enrolled are girls. The management encourages them to further their studies even after they get married while studying. This is a commendable step towards emancipation of women in society.

Economically very poor students are provided some odd jobs (2 hours per day) and paid some nominal amount in order to maintain themselves.

As the management is keen to provide higher education to tribal/rural masses, no minimum cut off marks in the qualifying examination has been specified and all those who aspire for higher education are provided admission. Most of the students are seen to be first generation graduating people. Every effort is taken to give a personalized attention to such students.

Since the students are eager in their studies, there has been wirtually no case of unrest in the campus.

The college functions in two shifts, one for Arts and Commerce sections and the other for Science section. This leads to an effective use of infrastructure facilities. Also the students are able to help their parents in their day to day routine during their leisure time.

Large number of welfare measures are extended to the employees which has brought the management and employees to work as a cohesive unit in the running of the college.

In the recent years the college has developed a feasible mechanism of ensuring punctuality amongst employees by maintaining an

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inward/outward time register. Through the efforts of the teachers and the support service offered by the management, there is a notable decrease in the drop out rate in recent years.

Part III Overall Analysis:-

The Peer Team visited the academic and support facilities of the A.A. College, had detailed discussions with all the stake holders (students, faculty, non-teaching staff, alumni, parents, Principal and management) and perused relevant documents to validate the information presented in the SSR.

Based on the above, the following commendations and suggestions are placed on record.

Commendations:-

- Strategic management through a dedicated Rayat Shikshan Sanstha.
- The institution's mission objectives of reaching higher education to the rural/tribal masses and empowerment of women being largely fulfilled through the various activities of the college.
- Motivation of first generation learners by involved teachers, to develop communication skills and self confidence.
- Exposure of students to need based and rural based skill development and enterprise.
- Promoting co-curricular and extra curricular activities amongst students to help them develop an integrated personality.

Suggestions:-

- Library resources to be augmented through book bank facility, inflibnet and necessary automation.
- Teachers to be motivated further to develop a research culture, seek research grants and career development opportunities.
- The institution may prioritize it's master plan for further infrastructure and academic development on the campus.
- Institution to improve communication network, inter and intranet facilities to reach staff and students, and prepare for a feasible egovernance for augmenting strategic planning and management.

 Management to be more sensitive to adopt a feasible pattern of transfer of its employees, to ensure continuity in the development and growth of the institution.

In conclusion, the Peer Team members wish to place on record the dedication of the Rayat Shikshan Sanstha in establishing the A.A. College of Arts, Commerce and Science in a rural area and managing it efficiently to ensure the mission objectives of its founder visionary Padmabhushan Karmaveer Bhaurao Patil.

While a ppreciating the co-operation lent by the management and staff of the A.A. College in the completion of the NAAC visit, the Peer Team wishes to place on record the dedicated and organized logistics planned by Mr.S.B.Adhav (Lecturer in Physics and NAAC Co-ordinator) during the institution visit. The Peer Team members wish the institution further progress in the years to come.
